Instructions to the Enumerators.

- 1. Study again the summarized House Numbering Procedure which you received with the list of your duties for the first phase of the Census.
- 2. Read these instructions repeatedly until you are completely familiar with them.
- 3. Study the Dummy interview sheet carefully and see if there are any particular types of houses/households in your block which are not included therein, or if there is any aspect of it which you do not understand, so that you may get your difficulties resolved in the Training Classes.
- 4. Always carry your letter of appointment and introduce yourself by means of it, explaining to each Householder briefly the objects of the Census and the fact that all true information gained in the Census is strictly confidential in respect of all persons and can never be used in any manner against their interests.
- 5. Remember that the "Household" is the smallest unit in the Housing Census and enter the necessary information about each and every Household on a separate line in the Housing Census Schedule.
- 6. Ensure that every Building in your Block has been numbered.
- 7. Carry out completely the Housing Census and Cottage Industry Enquiry. The Housing Census Schedule to be completed in duplicate and only one copy of the Cottage Industry Enquiry Form.
- 8. The entries are required to be made of the total number of each sex regardless of age, who are "normal residents". At this stage no effort will be made to include figures of floating population like visitors to households, homeless folks, etc., Hotels, Serais, Boarding Houses and Hostels will however, report the average number of their total occupants (staff, permanent guests and temporary visitors) as their normal inhabitants. Persons living regularly in Boats, Tents, etc. will be included where they are found.
- 9. Be ready at all times for a visit of inspection by your Circle Supervisor.
- DEFINITIONS—(a) Household is a collection of persons living and eating in one mess with their dependents,
 relations, servants and lodgers who normally reside together.
 - (b) Normal Resident or Usual Inhabitant is a person to whom the house is his or her permanent home or regular lodging place. Floating Population means homeless folks or regular itinerants, visitors to households, etc.
 - (c) Room is broadly a compartment of House large enough to be slept in.
 - (d) Cottage Industry: For purposes of this enquiry, a "Cottage Industry" is one which is carried on wholly or mainly with the help of the members of a household working whole-time or part-time on a handicraft or in manufacturing articles of utility, decorative or artistic value for sale mainly outside the village or Mohalla where they are manufactured. This will exclude repair and maintenance services, and will normally exclude village artisans such as the Lohar, Tarkhan, Kumhar, etc., unless they do special work so as to fall within the above definition.

METHOD OF RECORDING PARTICULARS IN THE ENUMERATOR'S REGISTER FOR THE HOUSING CENSUS

- 1. You have been given two copies of this Register, one of which (Copy No. 1) contains Cottage Industry Schedule which is also to be completed while taking the Housing Census. Even if there is no Cottage Industry in your Block the Cottage Industry Form should still be returned with the word "BLANK" written across it.
- 2. Your "Location Code" should be completed on each copy of the Housing Census Schedule and on the Cottage Industry Form at home before going out in your Block to fill up the Schedule & Form. This copy of the Housing Census Schedule and the Cottage Industry Form (Copy No. 1) should be completed while out in the Block carrying out the actual Housing Census. The second copy (Copy No. 2) of Housing Census Schedule may be filled up at home by copying out neatly in ink on it each evening the entries you have made on the original (Copy No. 1), during the day.
- Column (2) of Housing Census Schedule: The "Census House Number" given to the building or house should be recorded in this column. In a building there can be many houses. In such a case the building number should be recorded first, underneath the No. of the building, the No. of the house therein should be recorded separately. It should be remembered that in case more than one households are living in the same house, the particulars of each of the households will be recorded on a different line by writing "Do" in this column,
- Column (3): Enter the number of one of the eight types of material used in walls and in case where more than one material has been used in different portions of the house, enter the number of the principal material used in outer walls of the Major portion of the house.
- Column (4): Enter the relevant number as in column 3.
- Column (5): If a household is living in a boat or in tent, etc., then put the relevant No. (1, 2 or 3) in this column. Columns (3) & (4) will then be blank.
- **Column (6):** Give serial number to the households residing in the same house whose particulars are to be recorded on different lines.
- Column (7): If the household is living in "owned", "rented" or "free" house enter the relevant No. (1, 2 or 3) in this Column. In the case of servant quarters, etc., allowed free of rent, write the No. of Free (i.e. 3).
- Column (8): Name of the head of the household has to be entered for all occupied houses. For institution, hotel, etc., enter its name. For any unoccupied dwelling write "Vacant Residential" or "Under Construction residential" etc. For non-residential buildings write Mosque, Primary School, Office, Warehouse, Shop, "Vacant Shop" etc., "Under Construction Shop" etc., as the case may be.
- Column (9) to (16): Write the number in the appropriate column.
- Column (17) to (18): For making entries in columns 17 and 18 the head of the household should be specifically asked to state separately the total number of males and females included in the household. This will serve as a check on any possible discrepancy due to the under-reporting of females which must be continually guarded against.
- Column (19): Write the number of rooms occupied by the household (See instruction 10 (c) ante for definition of "room").
- Columns (20) to (25): Write the number in the appropriate column.

4.10 COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY.

There are two markets in the town—grain market and vegetable market. There are Rice Husking Mills in large scale. Besides Ice factories, Oil Crushing Mills, Cotton Ginning Factories also exist here. Handlooms are also functioning on a wide scale.

4.11 MOSQUES.

There are 3 big mosques in addition to 20 small ones. The most important being the Jamia Mosque.

4.12 PLACES OF RECREATION.

Hiran Minar and the Old Fort are the historical monuments, built by Emperor Jahangir. The Hiran Minar, though situated outside the limits of the Municipal Committee is connected with the town by a metalled road and is a very attractive recreation resort.

Shrines of Hazarat Pir Bahar Shah and Hazarat Data Shah Jamal are also very important. Annual *Urs* is held at both these *Mazars*.

There is one Cinema House, namely Regal, in the town.

There are two children parks maintained by the Municipal Committee and Red Cross Society. In the heart of the town, there is a beautiful municipal garden. A stadium has also been constructed recently. A service club both for men and women is also located in the town.

4.13 REST HOUSES AND HOTELS.

Two rest houses run by the Irrigation and Public Works Departments are located here. Besides there are a few ordinary hotels and restaurants.

CHAPTER 4

SHEIKHUPURA TOWN

4.1 NAME.

Shiekhupura town, the headquarters of the district, was founded by Emperor Jehangir and is named after him as he was called Sheikhu in his childhood by Akbar, the Great.

4.2 AREA AND BOUNDARIES.

Its area has recently been increased to about a square mile with the addition of villages of Arainwala and Chah Bhag Mall. The boundaries of the town are now extended upto Kot Ranjit in the north; Jiwanpura in the south; Qila Amir Singh in the east; and Ghazi Minars in the west. But for the Civil Lines, which house Government Offices and residences, the place still presents the look of a village.

4.3 CLIMATE.

The climate of the town is hot in summer and very cold in winter. It receives 15 to 20 inches rain, during the rainy season.

4.4 POPULATION.

Its population according to 1961 Census was recorded as 41,635 persons, Males being 22,915 and Females 18,720. In 1951, its population was 29,768, Males 15,893 and 13,875 Females, which has registered an increase of 40 per cent during the last decade.

4.5 LANGUAGES.

The main language of the town is Punjabi but with the influx of the imigrants from India, Urdu is also spoken.

4.6 CIVIC ADMINISTRATION.

Sheikhupura town is a Municipality. There are four Union Committees in the town. The municipality comprises of 4 elected members and 3 official members including the Deputy Commissioner who is the appointed Chairman. One of the elected members is the Vice-Chairman. The Municipal Committee looks after the sanitation, drainage and lighting etc., of the town. It also maintains 14 metalled roads measuring about 10 miles and 6 unmetalled roads measuring about 5 miles.

4.7 EDUCATION.

There are 2 Colleges for boys and 5 High Schools, 3 for boys and 2 for girls. Besides, there are 2 Middle Schools for girls and 15 Primary Schools, 9 for boys and 6 for girls.


4.8 MEDICAL.

There are 2 Civil Hospitals at Sheikhupura, one for Males and the other for Females. Their bed strength is 11 and 13 respectively. There is also a T. B. Clinic in the Town.

4.9 MEANS OF TRANSPORTATION.

The town is a railway junction. The trains coming from Lahore take their routes for Lyallpur and Shorkot. The town is also well connected by metalled roads with Lahore (24 miles), Lyallpur (62 miles), Sargodha (98 miles) and Gujranwala (39 miles), on which bus services ply in abundance including the Government Transport Bus Service.

longer in use. Each corner of the Fort has a copula-shaped watch-tower.

The Fort has changed hands. It has been once in the possession of Sikhs. They, besides tempering with the summer house, added a coarse brick building to it. This building lacks beauty and grace. After the Sikhs, it was occupied by the British. They also used it for different purposes.

3.3 NANKANA SAHIB

Nankana Sahib Town is situated on the northern corner of Nankana Sahib tehsil at a distance of 34 miles from Sheikhupura, the District Headquarters, with which it is linked both by Rail and Road. The distance of road route via Sheikhupura-Shahdara-Sharakpur-Mangtanwala-Nankana Sahib is 64 miles.

According to 1961 Census its population was recorded as 17,140 of which 9,119 were Males and 8,021 Females. Its population in 1951 was 16,599 and has thus recorded an increase of 3 per cent during this decade.

The town has a Municipal Committee consisting of 4 Union Committees. The Resident Magistrate is the Ex-Officio Chairman and the Vice-Chairman is an elected non-official. The Resident Magistrate is the Executive head of the Town, while Tehsildar is incharge of revenue work. It has also a Police Station and a Police Post for C. I. A. Staff.

At present there is no water supply arrangements except that drinking water is available through Hand Pumps and open Wells. Water Supply Scheme is under active consideration of the Committee. The town itself is Sem effected and the drinking water is thus salty.

The town has one High School for Boys and one for Girls besides a number of Primary schools both for Boys and Girls. The former two Schools are run by Government whereas the latter institutions are administered by the Committee

There is a Civil Hospital with 24 beds and a Veterinary Hospital.

Nankana Sahib is a sacred place of Sikhs because of the birth place of Guru Nanak Sahib. There are also number of important Sikh Gurdawars like Maljee, Tanboowala etc. and this town is visited by Sikh pilgrims from all over the World, especially on the birthday of Guru Nanak, the founder of Sikh faith.

The town is also equipped with Telephone, Telegraph and Electricity.

3.4 TOMB OF WARRIS SHAH.

It is located in village Jandiala Sher Khan at a distance of nine miles from Sheikhupura at Kacha road side. Warris Shah is a well-known Punjabi poet, author of the romantic story of *Hir-Ranjha*, which is highly appreciated and sung by the rural population Adjacent to this tomb is a tank whose water is considered sacred by some classes of the people.

CHAPTER 3

IMPORTANT PLACES

3.1 HIRAN MINAR.

The chief place of archaeological and historical interest, as well as of tourism in the district, is the Hiran Minar. It is miles from Lahore situated about 28 and 3 miles from Sheikhupura town connected with a metalled road. It is a tower 110 feet high and 30 feet wide having 125 stairs, which legend says, was raised under orders of Emperor Jahangir in the memory of his favourite and lovely deer called Mansraj, after his death. It is said that the deer was superb at fights and even hunted wild deer for his master. Adjacent to the Hiran Minar is a spacious tank. About 350 years ago, when Jehangir acended the throne, he ordered the construction of a three-storeyed Royal House, now known as Baradari, in the centre of the tank, to be approached by a causeway. It was a recreation and a hunting resort of the Mughal Emperor, Jehangir.

The tank which is 892 feet long and 570 feet wide has now been converted into a Fish Farm. This place is now the most favourite picnic resort in this part of the country especially for anglers who come in large numbers on holidays from far-off places. The place attracts foreign tourists also in considerable numbers.


3.2 SHEIKHUPURA FORT.

Sheikhupura Fort is located in the outskirts of Sheikhupura town. It is a Mughal monument and was built by Emperor Jehangir in 1619 A. D. Like other Mughal kings and princes, Emperor Jehangir was also very fond of hunting. In those days

the surroundings of Sheikhupura abounded in wild life and the Emperor used to go there regularly. The fort was constructed by Sikandar Mueen and served as a resting place for the Emperor. It is a grand gigantic rectangular edifice. It is made of small bricks and mortar. The huge gate of the Fort is reached by a flight of stairs. It is built on a high plinth. Immediately inside the gate follows a verandah concealing the main building and courtyard. From within this verandah another flight of stairs leads to the courtyard. Along the parapet adjacent to the gate are servant quarters. And a few paces farther on the right hand side is the summer house, a three storeyed building, the topmost having no roof at present.

The summer house is a small beautiful mansion. The interior and exterior walls are decorated with colour paintings. These range from simple florals to complete scenes of antelope hunting. Birds, animals, men and women are painted on the walls. All these are wrought in green, red, blue and crimson colours. The impressions are so deep and colours so fast that even the ignominous hands of rough times could not eraze them. These paintings and rough parapet signify the grandeur as well the tender traits of its builder-Empror Jehangir. The doors of the summer house are made of teak wood. These are decorated with fancy veils forming beautiful patterns.


There is a spacious courtyard, from where one enjoys the view of Sheikhupura town sprawling under the foot of the Fort. The courtyard has a deep well also, but it is no

The youth are fond of exercise, their main interests being wrestling and tentpegging. Western games, both indoor and outdoor, are played extensively in towns and cities, while in the rural areas the most popular game is the Volley-Ball.

2.17 RELIGION.

The main religion of the people is Islam and important groups. consist of Shia, Sunni, Hanfi, Wahabi and Ahmadi. The urban population is on the whole less religious than the rural. The westernised section of the community are less religious

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than those who live on tradition of national culture. Those who have modern education are less religious than those who received orthodox education. The richer classes are less religious than the poor classes.


The basic principles of religious groups are the same but they differ in details. Religious rights and ceremonies (prayers) Milad-un-Nabi meetings and Eid prayers are observed in their own circles. Christians of Catholic and Protestant Churches are to be found in the district. There is a United Presbyterian Mission in Sheikhupura. the continue to the same of the

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
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Tomb of Hazrat Nimat Ullah Sahib, popularly known as Mian Dewan Sahib, Khangah Dogran

law. It is a custom in some tribes to marry their girls in their own tribes. In some cases when they do not find suitable matches, they have to wait for a long time. In towns in some families, activities of getting higher education has been increased, both in males and females which prolong the age of marriage. Usually the marriages take places at the age of 18 years in rural areas.

The marriage ceremony is preceded by an engagement or betrothal, which is a promise to marry a particular girl to a particular boy. It is solemnized by an exchange of gifts. Festivities are held in both families and on appointed date for the marriage the bridegroom's party, the number of which depends upon the social position, goes in procession to the house of the bride's father which is decorated for the occasion. Nikah performed by the village mullah who recites the holy verses and explains the philosophy of marriage system and make the parties take certain vows and the contract is signed in the presence of the assembled. After Nikah ceremony, entertainments are served. The bridegroom's party is sent off with dowry for the girl and rich presents to the bridegroom and the father. The bride is taken away and is received with befitting ceremony and honour in the house of the bridegroom. On second or third day after the marriage, the bride comes to the house of her parents and after a day or two she again goes to the house of her husband. Some marrriages are celebrated in a simple manner but in most cases extravagence is resorted to and money flows like water on superficial festivities and ancient customs. Widow's marriage is not encouraged in some families. Divorce cases are not common.

2.12 BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

A married girl usually gives her first delivery at her parents house. Exchange of gifts takes place by the parents of the wife and the husband. In some cases festivities are held on a large scale. The Mullah sound prescribed holy words in the ears of the newly born child. Meat of sacrificed goat is distributed.

Deaths are hideously mourned in some families and work is suspended for many days. In uneducated classes, the death of the Octogenarians is celebrated like festivities.

2.13 OCCUPATIONS.

Cultivation is the main occupation of the people. Skilled labour and professional classes such as carpenters, black-smiths, weavers, shoe-makers, earthen-pot makers, masons and hakims help in the work of agriculture directly and indirectly. The farmer is known for his hardihood. He rises early in the morning, drives his cattle to the field and ploughs, weeds, and works there. He takes his breakfast at nine and again goes to work in the field and works till 12. From 12 to 3 he takes rest. In the afternoon, he goes to work. In the evening he returns home and takes meal and then goes to rest.

The women folk in the village lead a very busy life. They do household work, and pick up cotton from the cotton plants in the field. Children look after the cattle and herds of sheep.

2.14 CULTURE.

The introduction of canal-irrigation has robbed the farmer of the leisure which draught or timely rain gave him. He is more keen now to bring every inch of his land under cultivation. Amusement is, therefore, no part of his daily routine now. At noon when work is suspended, or in the evening when the day's work is finished the people gather under a shady tree, or in the cold weather round the fire in the villge *Takia* in the night when they talk and enjoy themselves. The usual topics of conversation are the crops, the rains,

The urban population commonly wear trousers and shirts. Modern educated people wear westerns style coat or Achkan and Jinnah cap. Cotton clothes are worn in summer and woolen ones in winter. Gloves, stocking, sweaters and wrappers are used in winter. The agricultural and poor classes wear thick cotton clothes in the winter. Their working dress is the qumees. Even those who are fond of western clothes such as pants, coats, waistcoats, etc., use local dress while at home in leisure.

The festival dress of women and men is of superior quality. Silk clothes are mainly used by women with ornaments such as finger rings, ear rings, bangles, necklace and hair clips. The rural population is accustomed to long clothes and like bright colours.

Accessories like Umbrella, long waterproof coats are not in use in the rural areas. 90 per cent of the rural population wear *Jutti* and about the same proportion of urban areas wear *Chappals* and boots. Women in urban area wear *burqa* to observe pardah while in rural areas, the majority of women use their *chaddars* or other head cloth for this purpose.

2.9 DWELLING HOUSES.

In village, houses are usually made of mud. Sarkanda and wood locally procurable are used for the construction of doors and roofs. The mud is usually taken from the beds of the ponds for plastering walls and floors. A moderate Zamindar's house consist of one big room and two small rooms at the sides. Mud reservoir of oval or rectangular shape is provided at the side of the room. In front of the rooms is a verandah and a vast courtyard. A shelter is built at the side of the courtyard to keep cattle. In several cases separate shelters are prepared. Poultry is kept in mud darbas or big baskets during the night. In big villages

and towns, houses are built in masonry. Cement, concrete lime, seasoned, wood, iron bars wire gauze and glass are used as material for construction.

The villages are usually a collection of mud houses with narrow and winding lanes, back to back houses and dark rooms and no system of drainage. The other type of villages are of regular shape. Streets are wide and straight. Disposal of waste water is made. Houses are ventilated. The houses of poor persons are deprived of decoration and furniture. They arrange their household effects in a way of decoration and paste unframed pictures on the walls of the rooms. The drawing rooms of a rich zamindar is equipped with fine beds, tables and chairs, sofa set, radio and framed pictures on walls.


2.10 FOOD AND HEALTH.

Wheat is the staple food in the district and Rice is taken only to introduce a variety in the diet. Villagers mix gram with wheat, as wheat alone is too fine to sustain the worker in the field against fatigue. Coarser cereals such as maize and barley are also taken for short periods, the last two as mixtures with wheat or with each other. Ghee or pure butter oil is an integral part of the diet.


The peasant takes the remains of the last evening's meal with a draught of butter milk before going out to work in the morning. When he goes out on an empty stomach, the *Chhahwela* or early breakfast is brought to him by his wife or a child. The heavy breakfast is always taken out to him in the fields. The remains of the morning meal or parched maize or gram form the light afternoon meal. Tea has now become extremely popular both in urban as well as in rural areas.

2.11 BETROTHALS AND MARRIAGES


Early marriage was in practice but the Government has prohibited it by framing a

trialisation, and greater educational and employment opportunities in urban localities.

2.4 LANGUAGES AND LITERACY.

The principal mother tongue of the district is Punjabi. The other important languages spoken in the district are Urdu and English. The percentage of people speaking these languages in the district is indicated in the table below:—

The number of literates (aged 5 & over) recorded in the 1961 Census is 1,19,016 out of which 94,511 are males and 24,505 females, which gives percentage of 12.2 for the population aged 5 and over. Considering the literacy figures by sex, the percentage of literacy amongst males is 16.39 and females 4.68.

The position of the district in respect of literacy in Pakistan is 38th and in West Pakistan 21st.

2.6 ETHNOGRAPHY, RACES AND TRIBES.

Original tribes are living in Tehsils Nankana Sahib and Shahdara and some parts of Sheikhupura Tehsil. They were called Jangli, but their majority has become settled now. They are sub-divided into Jat, Rajput, Kharl, Chatha, Dogra and Virk. At the time of partition, the Hindus and Sikhs evacuated the district. Various classes of people such as Jat, Rajput, Arain, Kamboh, Gujar, Kakkezai, Sheikh, Syed and Mughal etc., who migrated from East Punjab (India) have settled here.

2.7 PHYSICAL FEATURES.

The complexion of the old tribes is slightly dark. Majority of the people have gandami complexion i.e., neither dark nor white but rather brown. Some families have fair complexion. Agricultural classes are tall and stout.

2.8 DRESS AND ORNAMENTS.

The majority of the rural population both male and female, wear tehmand or lacha and kurta. The men wear pagri and the women wear dopatta for the head.

CHAPTER 2

PEOPLE AND THEIR ENVIRONMENTS

2.1 POPULATION.

The total population enumerated in 1961 was 10,80,619 excluding Non-Pakistanis out of which 5,76,587 were males and 5,04,032 females. The population enumerated in 1951 Census excluding Non-Pakistanis was 9,23,360 out of which 4,94,259 were males

and females were 4,29,101. The percentage increase during the 10 years between 1951 and 1961 works out to 17 per cent—the percentage of increase amongst the males being 17 per cent and among the females 17 per cent. The sub-joined table indicates the population growth in the district for the period 1901 to 1961:—

2.2 DENSITY.

The average density of population per square mile in the district works out to 467. The position of the district in order of population is 30th in Pakistan and 14th in West Pakistan. In order of density the district stands 28th in Pakistan and 12th in West Pakistan.




In respect of urbanisation the district has registered an increase of 3.70 per cent over the 1951 urban population, which shows the extent of mobility of the population. The principal reasons for mobility are indus-

pura does not figure much in the industrial sector. There are about 500 big and small Rice-Husking units all over the district. The Tanning industry is of post-Independence growth, the important factories being the National Tanneries, the Firdaus Tanneries, and the Rahman Tanneries, all clustered around Muridke on the Grand Trunk Road.

1.26 LAND REFORMS.

Under the Land Reforms 33 landlords of this district submitted their declaration, while 52 declarations were received for verification from the other districts. An area of 3,769 acres was resumed from 7 landlords, 2 from the district itself and 5 from outside it.

1.27 MEDICAL.

The district is provided with ample facilities of medical relief. There are Civil Hospitals at Sheikhupura, Nankana Sahib, Sangla Hills and Sharakpur with a bed strength of 41, 24, 32 and 10 respectively. There is also a Police Hospital at Sheikhupura with a bed strength of 18 and a Female Hospital with a bed strength of 13, a T. B. Clinic has also been opend recently. Besides, there are 35 Civil hospitals and Dispensaries spread all over the district both in rural and urban areas including 5 Canal dispensaries.

- (a) The Pakistan Highway (Grand Trunk Road) enters the district near Shahdara and leaves it at mile 23, the section within the district being 19.63 miles long.
- (b) The Lahore- Sharakpur- Lyallpur metalled road also enters the district near Shahdara and leaves it near Bucheke. Its mileage within the district is 45.39 miles.
- (c) The Lahore Sargodha- Mianwali metalled road too enters the district near Shahdara and passes out near Sukheke, the length of its section within the district being 48 miles.
- (d) Of the Sheikhupura-Shahkot-Lyallpur metalled road, the section between Sheikhupura and Shahkot is within the district and it measures 35.50 miles.
- (e) A 9.05 miles long section of Sheikhupura-Gujranwala metalled road lies within the district. It passes out of the district near Begpur.
- (f) Mangtanwala and Nankana Sahib are connected by a metalled road 10.72 miles long.
- (g) A 4 miles long metalled road connects
 Feroze with Warburton.
- (h) Of the Shahdara-Narowal unmetalled road, a 32 miles long section lies within the district.

There are in addition a few link roads like the Korotana link road and the Thakarke Link Road of which small sections lie within the district.

Well-maintained Canal-side roads are a feature of this district also. These can be used only under permits issued by the Irrigation Department.


(b) Railways.

Five lines of the Pakistan Western Railway (till recently the North Western Reilway) serve the district. These are:


- (1) Karachi-Peshawar Main Line. There are only two stations on this line which lie in the district. These are Kala Shah Kaku and Muridke.
- (2) Lahore-Shorkot Branch Line. The stations on the line lying within the district, as one comes from Lahore are—Missan Kalar, Qila Sattar Shah, Chichoki Mallian, Qila Sheikhupura, Bahrianwala, Bahuman, Mahmunwali, Warburton, Vakilwala and Nankana Sahib.
- (3) Shahdara-Chak Amru Branch Line. This line takes off from Shahdara (now in Lahore District) and the stations in the Sheikhupura District, which lie on it, as one goes towards Narowal, are Kot Mul Chand, Babakwal, Srirampura, Kala Khatai, Narang, Khunda Ladheke and Mehta Suja.
- (4) Lahore-Lyallpur Branch Line. The stations on this line within the limits of Sheikhupura district, as one enters from Lyallpur side are—Sangla Hill, Moman, Abdullapur Kolar, Dhaban Singh, Bahalike, Sacha Sauda, Chuharkana, Machhike, Qila Sheikhupura, Chichoki Malian, Qila Sattar Shah and Missan Kalar.
- (5) Wazirabad-Khanewal Branch Line. Sangla Hill and Marh Balochan are the only two stations on this line which lie within the district.





1.21 HORTICULTURE.

The main fruits grown in the district are Oranges, Mangoes and Jamman. The Shahdara vicinity is studded with orchards. The total area under orchards in the district is 4,816 acres, with no particular concentration.

The principal vegetables grown in the district are in common with the other districts in this part, being Onions, Garlic, Tomatoes, Brinjal, Cucumber and Melons in summer and Radishes, Carrrot, Turnips, cauliflower, Pease, Spinach and Potatoes in winter.

1.22 WATER-LOGGING AND SALINITY.

Sheikhupura is the worst affected district in the matter of waterlogging and salinity, the areas around Chuharkana, Shahkot and Nankana Sahib being the hardest hit. There are 6 soil reclamation projects in hand. Their names and the culturable area involved in each case is indicated below.

1.23 ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AND LIVESTOCK.

Except in the proprietary villages of the Bar and along the riverain, the cattle maintained are barely sufficient for the agricultural needs of the zamindars. The local breed of bullocks-is quite upto the mark and is preferred by intelligent zamindars to *Dhani* or *Hissar* bullocks as the latter species require to be better fed and be served with grain while the local breed, however, is much liked for their short legs which enable them to be more serviceable at threshing or pressing of cane as

they can turn so much more easily. The Doabi colonists, however, manifest a preference for the Hissar breed. The local breed has steadily improved, but the local cows are inferior milchers as compared with the Ganji cows. Buffaloes are preferred to cows as milchers. The Bar buffalo has good stature and heavy body and is not inferior to any imported breed.

Good horses are to be met within the Bar tract only. The local breed of horses has gradually gone out of fashion, its place having been taken by the Kathiawar breed. The horses of the Deg valley are of a very inferior quality. Camels are rare now. The Baluches of whom there are a small number at Sheikhupura proper, maintain some. Ridding camels are rarer still and are to be found only with well-to-do old inhabitants. The use of Camel as a plough animal is not unknown, though rare.

The incidence of herdsmen as compared with agriculturists is negligible.

There are no livestock, Horse-Breeding or Sheep-Breeding Farms in the district, but nucleus herds of *Dajal* breed of bulls at Feroze Wattuan and of *Lohi* breed of sheep at Sheikhupura and Nankana Sahib are being developed by the departments concered.

One stallion each is maintained at Shei-khupura, Nankana Sahib and Sharakpur for breeding. Four artificial insemination experimental centres have recently been started at Sheikhupura, Nankana Sahib, Sharakpur, and Muridke, as a promotion campaign.

1.24 COMMUNICATIONS.

(a) Reads.

The district has a total milage of 188.33 metalled and 33.97 unmetalled roads. This is inclusive of approach roads. The main highways in the district are:—

(b) Tube-wells.

To combat the menace of waterlogging, tube-wells have been sunk extensively in the districts, and have gained sufficient popularity. About 700 Tube-wells have been sunk so far and many more are a part of the Water and Power Development Authority Project of anti-waterlogging campaign.

The Persian Well Wheel is still popular.

(c) Flow or Lift Irrigation.

Jhalars set up on the Deg and its tributaries are still a feature of importance in the northern Bangar Circle of Ferozewala Tehsil. The gear is the same as that of the Persian Wheel and frequently the same gear is removed from a well to a Jhalar and back again to the Well.

1.21 AGRICULTURE.

The main crops during Rabi are Wheat and Gram and in Kharif Rice, Cotton and Sugarcane. In addition to these main crops, there are subsidiary crops known as Zaid Rabi and Zaid Kharif and Dobari. The area of Ferozewala Tehsil which is known as Kallar has a name for Paddy cultivation. The best variety is the Mushkin or Begmi. The area under principal crops is given below:

(a) Cross Husbandry Practices.

Cotton is sown preferably in succession to wheat. The soil is softer and the stubble stalks are easier to eradicate than in a field sown with *Chari*, which sends its roots deeper and because of being sown thick, takes more

of nutrition from the earth. Cane flourishes best on the Wadh of Senji. The leaves dropped serve as manure and the ample watering applied keeps the soil soft. Chari is sown preferably in succession to Toria. Maize is sown in succession to Cane or Cotton. It fails in succession to Wheat as it is attacked by ants. Gram cultivation is preferred in succession to Chari as the moisture of the last watering is available for sowing. Salt in the leaves of Gram helps all crops sown in succession to it. Senji is sown in cotton fields to recoup the soil. Rice land is fit for no other crop. Wheat and Gram are a popular mixture in the Bar villages. Well areas in the Khadir generally and specially fertile Neain (near the adadi) areas are everywhere subjected to double and even to triple cropping. Chari and Gowara are very commonly mixed in Bar tracts for fodder. and elsewhere Chari and Bajra are mixed as a fodder crop.


(b) Agricultural implements.

The chief agricultural implement is the common plough or *Hal* which is common in the district excepting the Colony portion where *Munna* imported by *Doabis* is more popular.


Improved ploughs introduced by the Department of Agriculture and tractors are also becoming popular.

(c) Fertilizers.


Due to Thur, Sem and Salinity, the cultivated area in the district has decreased. After Independence, the use of Ammonium Sulphate, which is distributed through official channels, has become very popular, having helped a lot in increasing the yield. 1,419 tons of fertilizer was sold by the Provincial Department of Agriculture during 1960-61, and the demand is constantly increasing.

1.19 BASIC DEMOCRACIES.

One of the most far-reaching and momentous reforms of the Revolutionary Regime was the introduction of Basic Democracies. The election to the Basic Democracies were held in early 1960. These institutions have created unprecedented social and political

awakening among the masses, who are now eagre to come to grip with the problems of poverty, illiteracy and disease in the rural areas. One of the principal aims of the Basic Democracies is the association of the people with the administration at each level and making the functionaries of Government accountable to the elected representatives of the people. The tiers of the Basic Democracies with their structure and composition is indicated in the table below:—

1.20 IRRIGATION.

(a) Canals.

The district is irrigated by the Upper Chenab and Lower Chenab Canals, the milage of their main channels in the district being roughly 14 and 44 miles respectively. The total area irrigated by each canal and their distributaries is indicated below:—

Collector. He is also responsible for the coordination of the functions of all nation-building departments in the district. On the judicial side he is assisted by an Additional District Magistrate and five Magistrates while on the revenue side he is assisted by a Revenue Assistant with a Tehsildar and a Naib Tehsildar in each Tehsil. For revenue administration the district is divided into three Tehsils namely Sheikhupura, Nankana and Ferozewala with headquarters at Shahdara and one Sub-Tehsil at Sharakpur. The first two have their tehsil headquarters at these respective places.

The police administration is vested in the District Superintendent of Police, who is assisted by one Deputy Superintendent of Police, on the executive side. For police administration the district is divided into fifteen police stations. Each Police station is under the charge of a Sub-Inspector with one or two Assistant Sub-Inspectors of Police. The average number of upper-subordinates in a police station is four and lower-subordinates fourteen.

The judical administration of the district is under the charge of an Additional District and Sessions Judge, who is assisted by one Civil Judge.

Ranjit Singh's troops for some years. In 1799 when Ranjit Singh entered the tract with a large army, the Bhattis offered a determined resistance and though defeated in the field they entrenched themselves in the fortified towns of Jalalpur and Pindi Bhattian. These were, however, taken by storm in A.D. 1801. Most of the Bhatti leaders were killed, the survivors who fled for protection to the Sials of Jhang were outlawed and their possession confiscated. When the power of Sikhs was broken in the 2nd Sikh War and the Punjab was annexed by the British in 1849, they returned and were restored to most of their old possessions.

British sub-divided the newly acquired Province and the whole of the upper portion of the Rechna Doab from Jammu to Jhang boundary and from Chenab to Ravi including the present Gujranwala District and that of Sialkot District was formed into one district. The temporary Headquarters were first at Sheikhupura and later for a short time at Wazirabad. In 1851-52, this wide jurisdiction was broken up and two districts were formed having their Headquarters at Sialkot and Gujranwala, the Gujranwala District as then arranged extending from the Chenab to the Ravi, and comprising the four Tehsils of Gujranwala, Ram Nagar, Hafizabad and Sheikhupura. At the close of the regular settlement in 1856, several villages of the Sheikhupura Tehsil were transferred to Lahore District and the Tehsil was abolished. In 1892, Hafizabad Tehsil was split into two, Khangah Dogran being formed into a separate Tehsil.

Sheikhupura District is of recent creation and was constituted in the year 1919 primarily to reduce the extensive boundaries and to remove the administrative difficulties caused by the unwieldiness of Gujranwala district as then constituted. It was enlarged later by contributions received from Sialkot, Lahore, and Lyallpur districts and consists of

the following tracts:-

- (a) The old Khangah Dogran Tehsil of Gujranwala District named Sheikhupura Tehsil from the transference of its headquarter to that place.
- (b) The old Sharakpur Tehsil of the Gujranwala District including partly Shahdara Tehsil, and the rest in Nankana Tehsil:
- (c) A block of villages detached from the old Rayya Tehsil of Sialkot District;
- (d) The trans-Ravi portion of Lahore Tehsil with the exception of a few villages retransferred to Lahore;
- (e) A handful of villages taken from Chunian Tehsil of Lahore District; and
- (f) A cluster of estates once forming part of Montgomery District and transferred in 1913 to Jaranwala Tehsil of Lyallpur District preparatory to their cession to Sheikhupura District on its formation.
- (c) and (d) are now included in Shahdara Tehsil and (e) and (f) in Nankana Tehsil. The headquarters of the new district remained at Gujranwala till 1921, and the shifting to Sheikhupura was completed in 1922 when the construction of new offices was completed.

The last territorial change comprised of the formal transfer in 1960 of the 6 villages of Kot Mohibu, Kot Begum, Nain Sukh, Sagia Kalan War, Shahdara Parao, and Shahdara to the Lahore Municipal Corporation in which they were already included.

Sheikhupura District has not been of much political eminence, being always eclipsed by its close proximity to Lahore.

1.18 ADMINISTRATION.

The district is under the general charge of a Deputy Commissioner, who combines the functions of District Magistrate as well as Ugah Shah a Dogar, built the mosque which still exists on the top of the mound. The antiquity claimed for the place is further confirmed by the unusually large size of the bricks $18" \times 10" \times 3"$, which are found all over the ruins, and also by the Indo-Scythian coins which until the recent past used to be found in great numbers after rains. Its history, therefore, certainly reaches back to the first century before the Christian era.

From the time of Huen Tsang nothing further is known of the history of Tse-kia or Taki, which had been superseded in importance by Lahore long before the advent of Muslim power.

For centuries following the Alexandrian invasion, the history of the Bar is a complete blank, though we know that the face of the country must have been considerably altered and the tract from being at least partially agricultural became wholly pastural in character. Consequently, when history once more begins to throw some little light on the condition of the people dwelling on the banks of Ravi and the Chenab, the Bar itself is a mere appanage to the territories of the predominent tribes who fought for and parcelled out its pastures.

Under the Muslim rule, Sahomalli, now in Shahdara Tehsil, and Sheikhupura were two of the six paraganas into which the tract between the Ravi and the Chenab was divided. It is not improbable also that Sahomalli included a part of the present Lahore district. It is entered in the list of *Mahals* given in the "Ain-e-Akbari" of the Rechnabad Sarkar. Town of Sheikhupura was established during the reign of Jehangir.

The position of the tract near the main route between Lahore and Peshawar exposed it to the full force of the early Afghan invasions and of the later struggles in the course of which the Sikh power rose.

The Bar tract of Sheikhupura Tehsil appears to have been held in Mughal times by Hinira and Jag Hindu Jats and most of the numerous ruins of what were once apparently flourshing settlements are identified with the days of their ascendency. When the central authority became enfeebled at the beginning of the last century, these industrious but unwarlike Hindu tribes fell a prev to the more vigorous Muslim tribes (Kharals and Bhattis) who speedily ejected them from all but a fraction of their villages. The portion of the Bar from Pindi Bhattian to Shahkot was controlled by the Bhattis. The Bhattis were the hereditary foes of the Virakas and the Kharals of the Upper Ravi, the main cause of dispute being the extent of the portion of the Bar over which each could claim supremacy. At one time, the three tribes patched up an agreement by which Shahkot was fixed as the boundary of their respective jurisdictions and in token of the compromise sank three wells which exist to this day.

In the general struggle for the soil, the Virakhs—a Sikh tribe with strong military traditions, got a foothold in the Tehsil and ejected the Bhattis from many villages which the latter had wrested from the Hinjras.

Over the whole district, the period between the decline of the Mughal empire on the death of Aurangzeb and the rise of the Sikh Confederacies (roughly the first half of the 18th centrury), was one of utter confusion and anarchy. The successive shocks of invasion from the north-west, encouraged by the absence of any strong central authority to maintain peace and order, and the devastation caused again and again by the invading armies of Nadir Shah and Ahmed Shah Abdali almost completely ruined the prosperity of the tract. The Bhattis struggled for some time to maintain their independence against the Sikhs and offered a guerilla resistance to

rent feature in the valley of Ravi river and cause extensive damage to the crops, buildings and roads. The large tracts of the district are under water for weeks together and the climate is rendered most unhealthy. During 1959 floods lasted from July to September and covered an area of about 638 square miles. Damage to the extent indicated below was assessed:—

(b) Locusts.

Locusts and swarms frequently visit the district, causing damage to the crops but no swarm of unusaual tensity has been reported recently.

(c) Wind-storms.

The wind-storms are common during the summer season, but they do not cause much damage. Earthquake are of rare occurrence.

(d) Hailstorms.

Hailstorms are sometimes met with during February and March when they cause considerable damage to the standing crops, which are then ready for harvesting.

1.17 HISTORY.

The abundance of *thehs* (ruins) or old sites of villages, existence of villages with most of the village hamlets evidently built on the

ruins of previous settlements, and instances of the accumulation of large ruins like those of Jige Kot and Nau Bahar, all suggest the existence of several settlements at the same spots, one ruined after the other. The belief is further strengthened by the fact that in most cases, villages are known by names which have absolutely no affinity with the caste and tribe of the present occupants, nor with the names of their ancestors who first settled in them. The names of some of mounds and villages carry us back to the early years of the known history. The village Ballarh with the fort of Sirkap, a monarch addicted to gambling-his stakes being the heads of his opponents, the Fort of Sirsukh, the village fort of Amba close to Ransi and lastly the villages of Kapi, Kalpi and Kandevi have legends connected with them.

The researches of the antiquarians have established the fact that the tract was of historical importance in the earliest days, that it contained in Sangla or Sakala the capital of the Punjab, where Alexander met with one of the most serious checks in his career of victory, and that at a later stage about 630 A. D., when he Chinese pilgrim Huen Tsang visted the area, Asarur near Khangah Dogran (also known as Masrur), was capital of a kingdom stretching from the Indus to the Beas. Huen Tsang calls the town he visited as Tse-kia, and describes it as the capital of a kingdom embracing the whole of the plains of the Punjab from the Indus to the Beas, and from the foot of the mountains to the junction of the five rivers below Multan. The site of this town, with a near approach to certainty, is identified by Genral Cunningham with a mound in this district near the modern village of Asarur. Popular tradition is silent as to the history of Asarur. The people merely state that it was originally called Udamnagar or Uda Nagari and that it was deserted for many centuries until Akbar's time

through Sialkot district, it gets divided into branches. Its activities within the limits of Sheikhupura district have been much restricted by the Rayya Branch of the Upper Chenab Canal, and its distributaries. Its water supply is no longer collected, as was done in pre-canal days. A large area higher up the course of the stream is subjected to Doba (submersion under water) by which standing kharif crops are damaged. The moisture is too much and continues too long to enable tillage to be done for the rabi crops except on some elevated spots which emerge from the water early enough. In fact, the Deg does more harm than good to the tract as a whole. The main Deg passes by Kala Shah Kaku, Kot Pindi Dass and Hadiala. Near the first named village it is known as Baghh Bacha or young-tiger, a nomenclature given to it for the loss of so many lives in the Fort near the village of Kot Pindi Dass. Yet another legend connects it with an event in the life of Gautama Buddha.

(b) The Bhed and the Lela.

The Bhed and the Lela were minor streams of local formation from the overflow of the big Deg Nallah and surface drainage. The former course has been intercepted by the distributaries of the canal. Both unite and fall into the main Deg before its junction with the Nikki Deg.

1.12 MARSHES.

The Deg valley abounded in Nallas and Chhambs. Big areas in almost every estate lay waste and their surface drainage gathered in depressions. Where this supply was supplemented by overflow from the Deg, a Chhamb was formed. Canal irrigation has, however, made Chhambs a post-history and only a few exist now.

1.13 MOUNTAINS AND HILLS.

The rocky eminences which jut out of the

level plain at Sangla and Shahkot, form a striking feature of the Sandal Bar, though they are not confined to it. The main hillock at Sangla rises to a height of 215 feet. The main rocks have been consumed by the Railway and Public Works Departments; the gravel being used for metalling roads. The hills at Shahkot are more closely grouped. They are all outlying spurs of the Raiputana range. The formation is, geologically speaking, quite modern, as the rock has not got beyond the mud-slate stage. The local Hindu legend with regard to these hills was that Hanumana of Ramayana dropped them when he was carrying rocks to bridge the straits between India and Ceylon.

1.14 CLIMATE.

The climate of the district, in common with the other districts of this part, is subject to extreme variations. From about the middle of December to the middle of March, the air is very damp or cold and light to moderate rain occurs at intervals. The cessation of the winter rains is succeeded by a spell of very pleasant weather. In April, the temperature rises fast and the two succeding months are very hot. Dust storms occur occasionally during the hot season, relieving temporarily the intensity of the heat. Towards the end of June, monsoon conditions appear and during the following two-and-a-half months, spells of rainy weather alternate with intervals of sultry oppressive weather. The rainy season is extremely trying in the Deg valley.

Most of the rain fall in July, August and September during summer months and in January, February during the winter months. The average rainfall in the district is about 25 inches.

1.15 NATURAL PHENOMENA.

(a) Floods.

During rainy season floods are a recur-

crude saltpetre. The Kallar earth is collected and spread over filter beds, which are copiously watered from unlined wells sunk immediately along-side the filtered solution is then run down to cement-lined floors, where it is dried by the natural heat of the summer sun.

1.8 FLORA.

The Bar jungle has almost entirely disappeared owing to colonization and extension of canal irrigation. Jand (Porsopis Spicigera) much prized for its firewood and charcoal is becoming a rarity. Karil (Capparis aphylla) is commonly met with, but is nowhere bigger than a shrub. Wan (Salvadora oleoides) which has also become rare is kept for its shade, which is sometimes very dense. Shisham (Dalbergia sissoo), Kikar (Acacia arabica) along canal banks have developed into fine big trees. No abadi is without a rich growth of trees mainly Pipal (Flous religiora), Bohar (Ficus bengalensis) and Sharinh (Albizzia lebbek).

The Deg valley was never favourable to the growth of trees. Kikar alone flourished to any extent. Lana and Lani shrubs on which camels are fed grow rank in Kallrathi wastes. Lana is used in making Sajji. Among grasses, Khhabbal or roots is the commonest grass in the Deg valley. Date trees are rare except near Shahdara, where a few clusters exist.

1.9 FAUNA.

There is very little of wild animal life in the district. Wild boar is met with in the riverain tract. Jackals are common and play havoc with the crops. Hares are everywhere to be found even in the *Lana* bushes. The district abounds in water-birds, which attract parties of sportsmen from Lahore on holidays. Water-fowls are found everywhere in the Deg valley, particularly after good rains. They are more numerous in the riverain tract

along the Ravi. Mallar teal, pachard and pintalls are the common varieties. Snipes are found in *Chhambs*. Black partridges are found along the Ravi and grey ones all over the district. Fish is found in abundance in Deg and Hiran Minar tank.

The snake requires to be specially noted. The Deg valley is notorious for its poisonous variety—the Karees or the Viper. It is short, thin and of the colour of the earth. It is extremely poisonous and its bite is always fatal. The Muridke vicinity has the worst snakes. Their number and also the venom is said to have diminshed since the advent of the canal, but they are numerous enough still to make the tract unsafe in the hot weather.

1.10 RIVERS.

The river Rayi which forms the southern boundary of the district enters the district from Sialkot at Chak Zafarwal Dattan in the extreme south-east and leaves it at Jhalar Lundi in the extreme south-west. Its course, however, is winding and at places it disappears for short intervals into the opposite districts of Montgomery, Lahore and Amritsar (India). The Deg Nallah joins it below Sharakpur. Its banks are for the most part low and flood water overflows them on either side. The Ravi silt is much valued as a fertilizer, but few estates on its banks enjoy a long lease of prosperous existence on account of its erosive action. The soil all along the course is light loam and is fairly productive. Higher up, the quality falls off into inferior sandy lands yielding indifferent crops. The whole of the southern length of the district is fringed by the Ravi riverain.

1.11 NALLAHS.

(a) Deg.

The Deg is a hill stream taking its near Jasrota in Jammu. In passing

CHAPTER 1

GEOGRAPHY, HISTORY AND ADMINISTRATION

1.1 NAME.

The district of Sheikhupura derives its name from its Headquarter Town, which was named after the Emperor Jehangir, who founded it, and who, while he was still Prince Saleem, was called Sheikhu by his father, Akbar the Great, in reverence to a Saint living in the vicinity, who had blessed the young Prince.

1.2 LOCATON.

The district, which is one of the four in the Lahore Division of West Pakistan, lies roughly between north latitudes 31°0′ and 32°5′ and east longitudes 73°5′ and 74°42′. Its shape is roughly that of a trapezoid with a traingular off-shoot to the west from the south west corner.

1.3 BOUNDARIES.

The district is bounded on the north by Gujranwala district, on the west by Lyallpur district, on the south by Montgomery and Lahore districts of West Pakistan and the Indian district of Amritsar and on the east by Sialkot district. Its southern boundary is formed really by the river Ravi.

1.4 AREA.

The total area of the district is 2,312 sq. miles. Its position in respect of area is 49th in Pakistan and 36th in West Pakistan.

1.5 PHYSICAL FEATURES AND TOPOGRAPHY.

The district naturally falls into three main divisions:—(a) the upland or Bar in the north-west, (b) the low-land along the

river Ravi, and (c) between them the valley of the Deg. The Ravi skirts its southern boundary all along its length and separates it from the districts of Montgomery and Lahore and Amritsar (India).

The Bar, in its natural condition, is a level prairie, thickly dotted over with a stunted undergrowth of bush jungle. A revolution has taken place since the advent of the canal. The Bar soil proved extremely adaptable to canal irrigation. The Bar tract to the northwest has heavy loam. The eastern fringes from north to south form the river Khadir and have light loam.

1.6 SOIL.

The Bar soil is popularly known as Missie. The worst type of this soil are the sand hillocks met with here and there in all tracts, and known as Tibba. The Missie lands are the most fertile, but these are not fit for rice cultivation, as they absorb moisture.

The central portion, which is the Deg valley, has stiff soil. Stiff soil is either Rohi or Kallrathi according to the presence of less or more salts (Kallar) in it.

1,7 GEOLOGY.

The only mineral products of the district are Kankar and Kallar. The small particles of Kankar may be burnt into lime. They are a feature of all Bar lands and are found on or a little below the surface. Kallar is found on mounds which are the sites of old ruined habitations and is used for the manufacture of

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

and re-sorted according to different characteristics in accordance with Sorting and Compilation instructions, issued from the office of the Census Commissioner, Pakistan. A large number of Sorters, Supervisors, Inspectors and Compilers worked on this tedious and difficult job under the inspiring leadership of Mr. Akhlaque Hosain Kazi. After the sorting operations were over the Record Sheets which were prepared for each tabulating region separately, were transferred to the Central Compilation Office at Lahore, where the data was compiled by Mr. Akhlaque Hosain Kazi, Assistant Director of Census (Compilation), West Pakistan. Thus data contained in Part IV represents the cumulative efforts of large army of workers, both paid and unpaid, to whom the Census Organization acknowledges a debt of deep gratitude, for without their efforts, there would have been no Census. I wish I could name all of them individually but that would require a volume in itself.

In Part V, a complete list of the villages of the district has been arranged by Tehsils, Qanungo Halqas and Patwar Circles. The Village Statistics give for each village, the Hadbast Number, area, total population by sex, total literates, total number of houses and house-holds. Besides the above, local details showing the location, Schools, Post and Telegraph Offices, Railway Stations, Police Stations, Union Council Offices, Dak Bungalows, Dispensaries and Hospitals, etc. have been shown by appropriate symbols. The Village Statistics were originally compiled in the Hand Sorting Centre, Lahore from the summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents. The figures of population were thoroughly checked after physical counting of the individual enumeration schedules at the Circle Sort. The data about houses and households are based on the summaries prepared by the Charge Superintendents on the results of

Housing Census conducted in September, These figures were checked and adjusted, where necessary, with reference to the results of the Machine tabulation done in the Census Commissioner's Office, Karachi. The literacy figures have been taken from the summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents after the "Big Count". The particulars of "Hadbast" numbers, and local details were obtained from the Deputy Commissioner. The area figures have been supplied by the Deputy Commissioner, Sheikhupura, and are based on revenue records. The Village Statistics were thoroughly scrutinised by the Statistical Officer in my office before incorporation in this Report.

The data presented have been arranged by Tehsils and in each Tehsil the Villages have been grouped by Field Qanungo Circles and within each Field Qanungo Circle by Patwari Circles. A summary giving the total population of the district with its distribution by sexes to the nearest thousand by Tehsils and number of Qanungo Halqas, Patwari Circles and Villages has been given at the beginning. Similar summaries by Field Qanungo Circles within each Tehsil indicating separately figures of urban localities have also been added.

Part I-General Description was compiled by Mr. Akhlaque Hosain Kazi, Assistant Director of Census, Lahore, Sardar Ghulam Farid, then Deputy Commissioner, Sheikhupura, supplied material for the people and their environments and important places. In preparing this Part they made extensive use of the District Gazetteers of Lahore and Gujranwala and various other published materials including the monthly West Pakistan published by the Director, Publications, Research and Films, Information Department, West Pakistan. The draft was seen and enlarged by Sh. Muhammad Sharif, Deputy Director of Census, West Pakistan, who added several useful suggestions. The Census Comquarters town. Besides, this Part also contains maps and pictures which have been provided to enable the reader to have a clearer perspective of the district and its people.

Part II includes tables giving general information provided by sources other than Census. Inclusion of this Part was considered necessary in order to bring within one volume some general statistical information which, like the Census data, is commonly required by planners and administrators. The general information tables include data on rainfall, temperature, Irrigation, Industries, Dak Bungalows, Educational Institutions, Hospitals, Roads, Basic Democracies, etc. These tables were collected from the Government Departments at the Provincial Headquarters and other Divisional and District Offices of some Departments. The data supplied by the Departments has been checked only for purposes of editing. While efforts have been made to eliminate all errors, the Census Organization is not responsible for the accuracy of the data presented in these Tables. In some cases data in respect of particular Tables was either not supplied in time or not in the required form. Such tables perforce have had to be omitted from this volume. My thanks are due to the Heads of various Departments and Offices for their ungrudging and prompt response. All these tables were carefully scrutinized by Mr. Haq Nawaz, Statistical Officer of may office and gone over by Sh. Muhammad Sharif, Deputy Director, before they were incorporated in this Report.

The Housing Tables which form Part III of this Report were entirely processed in the Machine Sorting Centre, Karachi. They were compiled and tabulated by mechanical operation on cent per cent basis for all urban areas, and on a 10% sample basis in the case of rural areas. The Housing Tables provide invaluable informa-

tion about the housing conditions in both urban and rural areas, the number of occupied and unoccupied houses, congested houses, size and structural characteristics of the housing units, size of family and the size of households, etc. All this work was done in the Machine Sorting Centre at Karachi under the able direction of Mr. W.A. Abbasi, Assistant Director, Machine Sorting Centre, to whom my thanks are due for furnishing this part of the Report.

Part IV contains the Population Tables which are based on data collected during the Big Count in January, 1961. These Tables provide data about population for smaller administrative areas down to Tehsils by sex and religion, urban and rural population, the composition of the population by age, sex and marital status, literacy and by mother-tongue, birthplace and main economic activities. It may be noted that detailed cross-classification of the Non-Agricultural Labour Force by occupations and industry has been left to be done by machine-sorting and the results will be published separately in a set of tables especially designed for the purpose. The Population Tables have been extracted from the Provincial Tables pertaining to this District. They are based on the data collected on the Individual Census Schedules by a large army of Census field workers, viz., the Enumerators, Supervisors, Charge Superintendents, District Census Officers and Zonal Deputy/ Assistant Directors. The names of some officers of each category are given elsewhere in this Report. In the District of Sheikhupura the Census was taken by 2,180 Enumerators, 273 Supervisors, 24 Charge Superintendents and one District Census Officer. After the field work was over records were sent by the District Census Officer to the Hand Sorting Centre, Lahore which worked under the able guidance and control of Mr. Akhlaque Hosain Kazi, Assistant Director of Census. Here the Schedules were unstapled and sorted

All the officers engaged in the original drafting of the various sections and chapters of Part I "General Description" of these reports gave commendable performance. It is no reflection on the merit of their work that despite their sincere and wholehearted work these drafts had to be thoroughly edited at the level of the Provincial Directors and Census Commissioner: The Provincial Directors have in their 'Introduction' related their experience in revising, enlarging or condensing, adjusting and checking the wealth of information already supplied in these draft reports. While doing so, they undertook extensive tours of the districts and brought their knowledge and experience to bear upon the final shape of the information given. I also felt it necessary to take extensive tours in the different sectors of our big and widely separated country and made demographic and economic investigation into representative facts. The District Census Reports of West Pakistan came under the thorough scrutiny of Mr. Aslam Abdullah Khan, Provincial Director of Census, while I gave only general editorial guidance. So far as East Pakistan Reports are concerned, I am glad to take the responsibility of large scale editing of the various chapters and sections. I was emboldened to do so by the fact of my association with the district, and sub-divisional administration of that Province for nearly a quarter of a century and also by the knowledge I had acquired during my extensive tours of every single Census District of the Province in the year 1960 in connection with the organization of the census.

For a small census organisation consisting of barely half a dozen officers at the top, publication of a District Census Report for each of the sixty-two districts and six agencies is undoubtedly a huge undertaking. We are painfully conscious of our shortcomings and limitations. None of my colleagues who produced the General Description of the Report claim to be a scholar "with a flair for penmanship"—a quality which Mr. Ikram desired in a writer of gazetteers-yet all of them took up the challenge cheerfully and did their very best to complete the job once undertaken. Ours is a modest effort which by no stretch of imagination can replace the excellent gazetteers. We were at one stage tempted to call Part I of the Report -a Brief Gazetteer-but we saw the peril in time and named it-General Descriptionwhich it really is. I would request the readers not to look for the details or merits of a gazetteer in these volumes but I do hope that until gazetteers are extensively rewritten, these will be found useful as up-to-date reference materials.

Khan shook Mr. Aslam Abdullah off his initial hesitation and in spite of his full-time occupation as Secretary, Basic Democracies, West Pakistan, thoroughly revised the descriptive portions of the Reports. In particular, his intimate knowledge of the Frontier areas and the districts of Quetta and Peshawar Divisions has enriched the reports of these districts. Mr. H. H. Nomani, M.A., S.K., who has varied experience of the district administration of East Pakistan as District Magistrate and Deputy Commissioner has also taken pains to go through the reports closely and given his valuable suggestions for their improvement. Mr. Aslam Abdullah Khan and Mr. H. H. Nomani stood solidly by me at all times of stress and strain and I am deeply grateful to them for their valuable help.

the districts extensively and consulted revenue and executive officers as well as well-informed local people about facts and statistics given in every section. The sections on Agriculture, Irrigation, Communication, Industry, Administration, Medical and Health, Education and Land Reforms are mostly original writings but do not fail to include relevant information from District Gazetteers not rendered obsolete by passage of time. The section on the Basic Democracies is an entirely new feature giving a brief pen-picture of the revolutionary concept of national and local administration as working in practice. The reports drafted by the Zonal Officers were sent to the respective Deputy Commissioners for scrutiny and comments. The object of routing the reports through the Deputy Commissioners was to ensure the accuracy and completeness of the facts and figures. The Deputy Commissioners, busy as they were with their multifarious co-ordinating and developmental activities, found time not only to check the drafts but in almost all cases also to add their personal contributions in several sections, thereby making definite improvements in the text.

The chapter on "The People and their Environments" is an attempt at a sociological and demographic study of the district. This was added in September 1961 when the Zonal Officers had already left the scene. As no specific instruction was given to the Zonal Officers earlier in this regard, their treatment of the demographic features was casual and incidental. The Deputy Commissioners were, therefore, asked to rewrite the sections on races and tribes, dress, dwelling houses, food and health, betrothals and marriages, births and deaths, religion, customs and usages, main and subsidiary occupations, and cultural pattern of the people. In these sections the District Gazetteers again played an important part but from their intimate knowledge of the district the Deputy Commissioners and their Revenue Assistants threw new and interesting light on the life and activity of its people. In several districts these sections have been entirely re-written.

The chapter on the "District Headquarter Town" was added much later and the help of the Assistant Directors of Census in charge of and Sorting Centres was very much welcomed at that stage for writing a brief account of these towns. This chapter is, in fact, an original contribution of the Census Officers.

It was not found administratively feasible to include in these Reports all the maps that the Census Organisation had collected during the census operations. I quite realise that the inclusion of urban area maps would have enriched these volumes but due to the overriding considerations of economy and time these had to be left out. Maps are, however, an integral part of any report that claims to present a comprehensive picture of the district and keeping this point in view two maps of the district have been included in these Reports. One of the maps is in colour showing the district by sub-divisions/Tehsils and such details as railways, roads, canals, rivers, hills and mountains, district, subdivision and Thana headquarters and important places. The other map is in black and white showing the industrial establishments and agricultural products of the district in symbols and letters. There is one feature in the District Census Reports which, to our knowledge, has not been included in any previous census or gazetteer publications. I refer to the photographs of the people and the land in which they live and work. Simultaneously with my request to the Deputy Commissioners for the report on the "People and Their Environments", they were asked to take suitable photographs of the peoples young and old, their activities in the field and at home, the typical landscapes and the places of historical importance and of scenic beauty, convinced about the tremendous value of presenting the district in all its aspects in a handy volume for the use of planners, administrators and the general public. After much consideration and consultation the scope of the Reports (except for the Agencies) was narrowed down to the following five parts only—

Part I .. General Description.
Part II .. General Tables.
Part III .. Housing Tables.
Part IV .. Population Tables
Part V .. Village Statistics.

For various administrative reasons the reports for Agencies will be much shorter without the Housing Tables and Village Statistics but they will contain information about different Tribes and their social and economic life.

It was actually Part I, General Description, which called for the greatest amount of labour, research and co-ordination by the Census Officers at various levels. As stated earlier, there were some views that this part should have been more or less an up-to-date version of the encyclopaedic District Gazetteer. As against it there were advocates in the Census Organization of cutting it to the bare bones and present only a short description of the geography, natural resources and the administrative system of the district. I found it necessary to strike a middle course between these two extreme views and after much consideration the "General Description" was planned to contain the following chapters-

Chapter I . . History, Geography and Administration.

Chapter II . . People and Their Environments.

Chapter III .. Important Places.

Chapter IV .. District Headquarter Town.

I must admit that the inclusion of the last three

chapters is my idea as I felt that this would constitute a special contribution of the Census Officers to the total information about the districts. Population Census is admittedly the most comprehensive national stocktaking that a country embarks upon from time to time. The main object of census is no doubt taking an accurate count of the people according to their various demographic and social characteristics. In the process of census taking, however, a mass of related and ancillary information is collected, directly or indirectly, by the census-taker. The 'Census Officer', to use the generic term, applied to all those who were appointed to take the census, travelled widely and observed closely all manner of men and lands, thereby gaining valuable knowledge of the physical features, agriculture, industry, public health, communications, housing and above all of the way of life and cultural pattern of the people. I had no doubt in my mind that these officers could pool their knowledge and write out a short account of the people and their environments, the important places they saw and the district headquarter town in which they worked with great deal of confidence and accuracy. Despite various limitations, particularly lack of reference material and shortage of time, the Zonal Census Officers wrote out the draft Reports in time.

The Part I—General Description—of these Reports is essentially a compilation rather than a fully original writing. The very nature of the assignment left hardly any choice but to make the well-documented and authoritative District Gazetteers the main source of this compilation. The sections on physical features, geography, geology, climate, river and mountain systems, flora, fauna, history are largely adaptations from the relevant District Gazetteers. These have, of course, been modified, revised and enlarged wherever necessary to make the information up-to-date and factual. The Zonal Officers also toured

FOREWORD

The "district" in Pakistan is the basic unit of administration and the focal point of all social, cultural, economic, administrative and developmental activities. This administrative reality was made the key-note of the publication programme of the 1960 Housing Census and 1961 Population Census. Accordingly, a separate report for each of the 62 Districts and 6 Agencies was included in that programme. The idea originated in June 1960 with my predecessor in office Mr. R. D. Howe, MBE, SQA, CSP, ably supported by his Deputy Mr. N. Shamsi. As initially conceived the District Census Report was to have been in 8 parts, namely:-

Part I .. Geography and brief history of the administrative district.

Part II .. General Information.

Part III .. Housing and Household
Statistics.

Part IV .. Vital Statistics.

Part V .. Cottage Industries.
Part VI .. Population Statistics

Part VII .. Village Lists.

Part VIII .. Maps.

It was intended that the Village List should also include the complete location code number of every village and a fairly complete description of each block. Part VIII-Maps-was intended to include, besides the maps of the district, all urban area maps which have been collected and made up-to-date during the census operations. Recognizing that it was a very Mr. Howe, while asking for the views of the Provincial Directors of Census, frankly said: "Admittedly, it is an ambitious project, but in my opinion the

labour involved will not be out of all proportion to the tremendous value of the end product."

The first reaction of the Provincial Directors was not favourable. They thought that the Zonal Officers did not have the time and necessary background to do justice to Part I-'Geography and brief history of the administrative district'. Meanwhile, Mr. S.M. Ikram, C.S.P. Member, Board of Revenue, West Pakistan, got interested in the District Census Reports and he hoped that "in spite of obvious difficulties the Distt. Census Reports should be enlarged and converted into handy business-like Decennial District Gazetteers". Mr. Ikram's idea was pursued for some time but when it was found that the rewriting of Gazetteers involved far greater efforts outlay and much longer time than Census could afford, the Census Organisation reverted to the original plan of a brief narrative for Part I.

It was planned that the Zonal Census Officers would write short notes on the history, geography and a few administrative activities of the district after the Big Count was over in 1961. The Zonal Census Officers were actually busy in the field collecting the preliminary reports and consolidating them for inclusion in the provisional census results of Pakistan till the end of February, The work on the writing of the descriptive part was not therefore started until the middle of March 1961. I took over from Mr. Howe in the beginning of March 1961 and, although, initially, like Mr. Aslam Khan, Provincial Director of Abdullah Census, West Pakistan, I was myself hesitating from a sense of inadequacy to undertake such a big project, it did not take me long to be

The "Hadbast" numbers are the numbers assigned to a revenue estate at the time of the settlement operations. They are allotted serially within the tehsil at the time of settlement. Hence the arrangement villages in each tehsil does not follow the serial order of Hadbast numbers, but within each Patwar Circle they have been arranged serially. Where no survey and settlement operations have been carried out, this column is left blank. The area figures have been supplied by the Deputy Commissioners and are based on revenue records. Local details regarding Schools, Colleges, Post Offices, Telegraph Offices, Railway Stations, Police Stations, Rest Houses, Union Council Offices, Hospitals, Dispensaries, Electricity, Tubewells, etc., have been indicated by appropriate symbols against each village. A list of these symbols is appended. These details have been obtained from Deputy Commissioners and from the concerned Departments. The data has been presented by tehsils within each district. In each tehsil, the villages have been grouped by Field Qanungo Circles and within each Field Oanungo Circle

by Patwar Circles. The name of the Field Qanungo Circle has been separated from the text by double lines and the village in which the Patwari's headquarter is located is shown in bold print.

The Village Statistics for this district were compiled in the Hand Sorting Centre, Lahore under the supervision of Mr. Akhlaque Hosain Kazi, Assistant Director of Census, Incharge of Hand Sorting Centre, Lahore. After compilation, the lists were sent by the Officer-in-Charge, Hand Sorting Centre, to the Deputy Commissioner concerned for verification and completion of figures relating to "Hadbast" numbers, area and local details. After this verification, the Village Statistics were sent to my office, where they were further checked, adjusted and consolidated before publication.

A summary giving the total population of the district and distribution by sexes to the nearest thousand has been given in the beginning. Similar summaries by tehsils and by Field Qanungo Circles within each tehsil have also been added

INTRODUCTION

The village is the basic unit of revenue administration and the need for basic statistics for villages is quite obvious as all planning depends on such statistics. They are also indispensable for carrying out sample surveys over limited areas and form the basis of continuous collection of statistics on different aspects of rural life and economy. The village was taken as the basic unit of enumeration if its population was 600 or it was a continuous collection of about 150 houses on an average. Where the village approximated to this size, it was constituted into a Block. A large number of villages had to be split up into a number of Blocks, but the boundaries of Census Block did not go beyond the limits of a revenue estate. All statistics pertaining to a village concerning land administration are given by "Mauza" or revenue estate and the importance of this territorial unit in our administrative set-up is unique. A "Mauza" may be defined as a parcel or parcels of land having a separate name in the revenue records and known limits. The unit of revenue administration is the revenue estate or "deh" which is usually identical with the village or "mauza". A revenue estate is a unit of area-

- (a) for which a separate record-of-rights has been made, or
- (b) which has been separately assessed to land revenue or would have been so assessed, if the land revenue had not been leased, compounded for, or redeemed, or
- (c) which the Local Government may by general rule or special order declare it to be an estate.

The Village Statistics contained in this part have been compiled from Block-wise figures contained in the Summaries prepared by the Census Supervisors and Charge Superintendents. Except for data on houses and households they are based on the results of the "Circle Sort" which was carried out in the Hand Sorting Centres after the physical counting of the individual enumeration schedules. The literacy figures, however, have been lifted from the Summaries prepared by the Supervisors and Charge Superintendents.

The plan of presentation is that for each village, the Hadbast number, its name in English and Urdu and area in acres, the total population by males and females, and the number of literates in each village has been recorded.

The last two columns pertain to number of houses and households. This information is based on the Housing Census which was carried out in September, 1960. The data was collected in the first instance from the Summaries prepared after the Housing Census by the Charge Superintendents. These figures have been checked with the results of the Machine tabulation in the case of urban localities, but since only 10 per cent sample was taken for the villages, the data of villages has been extracted directly from the Household Summaries. The number of houses refers only to the "occupied" houses. while the number of households refers to the commensal unit the members of which live together and eat from a common kitchen. The definitions of "houses" and "households" are given in the Explanatory Note.

Explanation.—Include any infant born alive who may have died since.

If a woman has been married more than once the two questions should cover the whole period she remained married from the date

of her first marriage. For example a woman married for the first time and after 5 years was divorced. Some years later she remarried and her (new) husband died 10 years later, since when she has remained a widow. In this case "Total years remained wed" is 5+10=15 years.

After filling up a Schedule for each member of the household, you should check again that no one in the household (particularly daughters-in-law) has been over-looked. Also that no one normally resident in the household is temporarily absent and expected back before the 31st of January 1961.

Progress Reports:

Carry out the enumeration of your area progressively every day. Don't leave the work to be done towards the end of the Enumeration Period. In order to ensure this, report regularly to your Supervisor in the prescribed forms regarding the percentage of the work completed on the dates shown in the Calendar. The first round of your visits to all the houses in your Block should be completed during the 1st two weeks. Then during the next three days carry out a 2nd round and enumerate the Households that might have been left out during the 1st round, and also those normal residents who were temporarily absent, but have since returned and have not been enumerated elsewhere. Two days before the last date (i.e., 29th January 1961) make an announcement in your Block that persons left out may kindly report to you at an agreed place and get themselves enumerated. Continue the checking for omissions during the last two days and then on the actual Census Night (Night of the 31st January) you must make a rapid and thorough examination of the whole Block. All new arrivals, travellers, wanderers

- (ii) or Are you an EMPLOYEE?

If yes, ring round "2" under "Employee".

If yes, ring round "3" under "Independent worker".

Explanation.—Every non-agriculturist who is economically active must be classified under one and only one of the above categories.

Note that the whole question concerns the main occupation given in question No. 16. Persons who employ others in their profession or business will be classed as "Employer". No one will be classed as "Employer" merely because he employs domestic servants. For example, a cook is classed as an employee in his occupation, but if he is cooking for, let us say, a civil servant, the latter will not be shown as an employer on that account. Similarly a Company Director for instance, although he may have power to appoint and discharge Company staff, will not be classed as "Employer", because he himself is an employee of the Company. An independent worker is his own master in his trade or business who does not employ others. An unpaid family help is a member of the family who assists directly in the trade or business of another member but receives no separate payment in cash or kind.

IF A PERSON HAS NO SUBSIDIARY OCCUPATION, PUT A CROSS IN THE BOX.

Explanation.—Enter the name of Subsidiary Occupation in full, or at least, in sufficient detail to ensure identification from the Main Occupation.

In order to claim "Subsidiary Occupation", a person must be following two occupations, the second being pursued in addition to or alternatively to the "Main Occupation".

This may be either a secondary source of income pursued throughout the whole year or an alternative means of livelihood adopted at times when the main occupation cannot be followed. This distinction, however, need not be recorded, and it is only necessary for the Enumerator to say what, if any, is the secondary or alternative means of livelihood of the respondent.

In rural areas the Subsidiary Occupation (if any) of cultivators will generally be one of the agricultural occupations such as poultry, bee-keeping, etc., or a cottage industry. Service on roads or in the militia may be a normal subsidiary occupation in some areas. When Cottage Industries are given as subsidiary occupation, they should be described as "Home weaving", "Home pottery making", "Home mat making", etc.

Q. 21. DETAILS OF INACTIVES?

(i) Do you work as HOUSE WIFE, i.e., perform household duties only?

(ii) Do you receive any kind of RENT, PEN-SION, etc.? Only those persons who are ringed as "3" in question No. 15 should be asked: Ring round number "1".

Ring round number "2".

The entry has to be made *only* if the person is working, or if not working, has been previously working and is at present looking for work. In the case of a person who is looking for wo.k for the first time, enter "X" against this question.

Industry refers to the activity of the firm, establishment or department in which the person is employed or to the kind of business the person operates. The following are examples of Industry/Business descriptions:—

Stock-raising, forestry and logging, fishery, biscuit making, clothes making, furniture making, brick manufacturing, pineapple canning, cotton ginning, cotton textiles, jute textiles, woollen textiles, tannery, leather products, black-smithy, motor repairing, road making, fish retailing, boot and shoe retailing, banking, insurance, architecture, advertising, cinema, restaurants, hotels, laundries, hairdressing, etc.

Railway transport, motor taxi service, motor cycle rikshaw service, air transport, postal services, primary school, technical school, university, Governmental medical services, private medical services, social welfare services, legal services, domestic services, armed services, etc.

The list is not comprehensive but it should indicate the variety of descriptions and the degree of precision required.

Q. 18. AGRICUL- Only for persons TURAL STATUS? ringed "T" in question No. 16.

For instance a man who owns a little land which he cultivates himself, who also has some land on rent, and who in his spare time works for reward in agriculture for others, will have rings round numbers 1, 2 and 4.

Q. 19. STATUS IN BUSINESS, TRA-DE, INDUSTRY OR SERVICE? For persons Not ringed "T" in question 16.

(i) In your main occupation do you EMPLOY OTHERS? If yes, ring round "1" under "Employer".

Q. 16. WHAT IS YOUR MAIN OCCUPATION?

(what kind of work do you do)? If a TILLER OF THE SOIL, ring round "T" and move on to Q. 18. Otherwise write the OCCUPATION.

Explanation.—A tiller of the soil is one who himself works on the land or gets it cultivated under his direct personal supervision. Information regarding "Main Occupation" is required only if the person is "WORKING" or, if not working is "LOOKING FOR WORK". It is essential that a person's occupation be recorded in such a way that it may provide an adequate description of the work he is doing, or is looking for. In the case of a person looking for work for the first time, enter "NONE YET".

For your guidance a list of descriptions of occupations which are not acceptable without qualification is given below. This list is not comprehensive but gives an idea of the precision required.

Administrative Officer.—State whether Government Administrative, City Council Administrative Officer, etc.

Clerk.—State whether accounts clerk, correspondence clerk, stores clerk, solicitor's clerk, tally clerk, timekeeper, etc.

Driver.—State whether lorry driver, bus driver, taxi driver, car driver, tractor driver, railway engine driver, crane driver, bulldozer driver, etc.

Conductor.—State whether bus conductor, band conductor, railway conductor, etc.

Engineer.—State whether civil engineer, electrical engineer, mechanical engineer, mining engineer, motor engineer, etc.

Factory Worker.—State the exact nature of work done and the kind of factory.

Inspector.—State whether fire inspector, health inspector, labour inspector, police inspector, traffic inspector, ticket inspector, railway inspector, vehicle inspector, etc.

Labourer.—State whether dock labourer, earth moving labourer, godown labourer, transport labourer, etc.

Manager.—State whether finance manager, personnel manager, general sales manager, textile retail manager, owner or partner (stating nature of business), etc.

Mechanic.—State whether motor mechanic, radio mechanic, lift mechanic, etc.

Owner Proprietor.—State nature of business owned.

Salesman.—State whether retail shop salesman, insurance salesman, ticket salesman, newsboy, street vendor, wholesale commodities salesman, broker, auctioneer, etc.

The description should be appropriate to the actual work done irrespective of educational, professional, or technical qualifications achieved by a person. Vague, incomplete and ambiguous descriptions like "service" "Labourer" "Mulazmat" should be avoided.

For PERSONS NOT RINGED "T" IN QUESTION NO. 16.

Explanation.—Enter the name of the Industry, Business or Service in which the person is working.

O. 14. OWNERS OF AGRICUL-TURAL LAND. DO YOU OWN AGRICULTUR-AL LAND IN PAKISTAN?

Ring round "Yes" or "No" as appropriate.

Agricultural Explanation.—(1) land includes land producing crops and also banjar. It excludes building sites and land reserved for residential purposes such as 'Abadideh'.

- (2) Owner of Agricultural land includes one shown as such in the Revenue records (khewat or khata). But it also includes Lease purchasers, Mortgagees with possession. Refugees and other persons who have been given provisional or permanent allotment of Agricultural land and Grantees of land in Colonies on instalment payment or other bases (including those who became owners after Land Reforms).
- (3) Owner excludes those who are mortgagees without possession and adult sons of landowners who work their parents' land, with or without their own ploughs. It excludes also all occupancy and other tenants and share croppers.

Explanation.—(1) If the respondent is: not a tiller of the soil, this question should be: put with specific reference to "WORKING" or "NOT WORKING BUT LOOKING FOR WORK" during the last week, i.e., a non-agricultural worker who has not been working, but looking for work during the last week will be ringed "2", but if he has done any work for profit, etc., during the week, he will be ringed "1".

- (2) "Inactive" is a person who is not working to earn his livelihood nor is he in search of any work. Students and Housewives doing only household duties are to be treated as "Inactive". But persons who are helping any member of their family in his profession or trade, even if they are not paid for such work in cash or kind, are to be classed as "Working". Persons not working and living on rent or pension only are also to be treated as inactives. Beggars and Prostitutes are also to be classed as inactives, because, although they do earn, they are not helping in the production of economic goods.
- (3) In the case of "Inactives" questions 16 to 20 will not be asked but the details of their categories will be ascertained from Ouestion No. 21 and recorded accordingly.

Questions 16 to 20 to be asked only of persons who are "WORKING" OR "LOOKING FOR WORK", i.e., who are ringed (1) or (2) in Q. No. 15.

Technical Institutions include Polytechnics, Technical High Schools, etc.

Maktab or Madrasa includes places where the Holy Quran and often elementary Urdu or other local languages are taught by an Imam, Maulvi or other teacher.

(This applies both to those who are now attending School/ College, and to those who have completed education).

Explanation.—Write down exactly what the respondent says. People know quite well whether they regard themselves as Pakistani or not and it is their opinion that has to be recorded.

For non-Pakistanis record the name of the country of which they claim to be Nationals.

Afghan Powindahs.—If an Afghan does not know whether he is a Powindah, ask him how long he is staying in Pakistan. If he is only here for the winter, treat him as a Powindah.

Q. 7. RELIGION? Ring round the appropriate number.

Explanation.—Accept respondent's own classification. The last blank box is intended for persons who claim a religion other than those recorded on the schedule, when the religion claimed should be written in the blank box. If a person claims no religion, write "None" in the blank box.

Q. 8. DISABLED?

If totally blind, ring round "1" under "Blind".

If deaf and dumb, ring round "2" under "Deaf and Dumb".

If crippled ring round "3" under "Crippled".

Explanation.—A person will be treated as blind if he cannot count the Enumerator's

fingers held up about one foot in front of his face with or without spectacles, and as "Crippled" if he is permanently unable to use one or both of his arms and or legs. A person who is deaf but *can* speak, or dumb but *can* hear will *not* be counted as "deaf and dumb".

IF NOT DISABLED PUT A CROSS IN THIS BOX

Q. 9. MOTHER TONGUE?

Ring round the appropriate number under languages.

Explanation.—One of the last blank columns is intended for persons whose mother tongue is not one of those named on the schedule; when that is the case write the name of the language in the blank heading and then ring the number underneath. Every person must have a mother tongue. In the case of a young child who is as yet unable to speak, or of a deaf-mute, the language to be entered would be that principally spoken at the present time in the home by the parents or guardians. A person cannot have more than one mother tongue and for this reason there should be only one entry in this column.

Q. 10. OTHER LANGUAGES YOU CAN EASI-LY SPEAK?

Ring round the appropriate number under languages.

Explanation.—The respondent should not claim to speak any language unless he can easily converse in it. If he claims to be able to speak languages which are not provided on the schedule write the names in the blank columns and ring the number in the appropriate box. The language already ringed as mother tongue in the preceding question should NOT be ringed again in this question which deals only with OTHER languages spoken.

Explanation.—Enter age in completed years, except for children less than 12 months old e.g., a person who will be 20 years 10 months on 31st January, 1961, should be entered as 20 years and not 21 years. For a child less than 12 months old, enter number of completed months. Enter "0" months when under 1 month. If age is not known, try to ascertain the age as accurately as possible by reference to any past event which may be remembered. The estimation of age is of great importance and calls for intelligence and diligence on the part of the Enumerator. It will generally help in the estimation of ages to enumerate the children in a household starting from the youngest child.

Q. 4. MARITAL STATUS?

Single.	Ring round "1" under "Single."
Married.	Ring round "2" under 'Married'.
Widowed.	Ring round "3" under 'Widowed.'
Divorced.	Ring round "4" under 'Divorced'.

Explanation.—"Single" applies only to persons who have never been married.

"Married" includes all persons who are at present married, all persons habitually living together as man and wife and all persons living apart but still married and not widowed or divorced.

"Widowed" applies to a person whose husband or wife is dead, and who has not married again.

"Divorced" applies to both divorcer and divorcee if not remarried.

Q. 5. WERE YOU BORN IN THIS DISTRICT?

If not, WHERE?

If yes, ring round "Born in".

For other places in Pakistan write name of the District.

If born in "Azad Kashmir" or "Occupied Kashmir" the word "Azad Kashmir" or "Occupied Kashmir" should be written along with the name of District.

If born in India, write "India" along with the name of District.

Elsewhere write name of COUNTRY ONLY.

Explanation.—Birth place means the country or district in which the person was born according to present political boundaries which may differ from those existing at the time of birth.

Q. 6. ARE YOU A PAKISTANI?

If a Powindah; ask are you an Afghan Powindah?

If a Kashmiri:

Are you a national of "Azad Kashmir" or "Occupied Kashmir"?

If yes, ring round "PAK".

If yes, write "AF-GHAN" and put "Powindah" after it.

Write one of them.

Have you been enumerated already? If "NO" ask question (a).

(a) Is this your present REGULAR residence or lodging place? If "YES" carry out enumeration in full. If "NO" ask question (b).

(b) Will you be BACK in your normal residence before 31st JAN-UARY, 1961? If "NO" or doubtful, carry out enumeration.

If "YES" do not fill in this form, but carefully warn the person that it is his/her duty to see that a form is made out at his/her normal residence.

Q. 1. NAME ?

Write it out.

If a tribesman put name of tribe, clan and section of tribe after the person's name in the Quetta and Divisions Kalat and in the area between the Durand Line and the settled Districts in the Peshawar and Dera Ismail Khan Divisions. In the Chittagong Hill Tracts, put name of Tribe.

Explanation.—Statistically names have no significance and the record of names will

be later destroyed. The reason for the recording of the name is to assist you in obtaining correct information and in preventing double counting. If a child has not been named enter "Son of——" "Daughter of———". If any person is hesitant to let you know the names of female members of his household, do not insist upon knowing the name but write down "Wife of———", "Daughter of———" and so on. Similarly if the respondent is a woman, do not insist upon knowing the name of her husband or any such person whose name she is reluctant to give in view of any prevailing custom.

Relationship to

Explanation.—For Head, write "Head". For wife or husband, son or daughter of Head, enter "wife", "Husband", "son", "daughter" as the case may be.

Ring round "male". or "female".

Explanation.—Every person will be classed either as male or female. Eunuchs will be recorded as males.

Q. 3. AGE ?

Write the number of years completed on the 31st January, 1961.

For infants under one year.

Write number of completed months in box "Under one year", i.e., 0 to 11.

- 6. Should any person object to answering any Census question you should explain that the information collected is STRICTLY CONFIDENTIAL, that it will not be communicated to any person whatsoever, and that no use will be made of it, which can in any way injure the respondents interests.
- 7. Spoiled Schedules should <u>not</u> be removed from the pad, but should be clearly cancelled with a cross on both sides. If a wrong entry is made by mistake under any question, it may be neatly cancelled by a cross (x) and the right entry made.

Whom to Count:

- 8. The object is to include in the Census all persons who are normally residents of Pakistan and all visitors to Pakistan during the Enumeration Period. The Census is to be complete and the motto should be "catch every person", but no one should be counted more than once.
- 9. Therefore visit each and every house during the Enumeration Period, missing no place in your Block. Write a schedule for every person you find there who is a Normal Resident, and also for visitors, travellers and wanderers in accordance with these instructions.
- 10. A Normal Resident in a house is a person who has his or her present regular residence of lodging place there. If you have any doubt as to whether a person is truly a normal resident, you should fill in a schedule for him or her and make a note to consult your Supervisor.
- The object of the Preliminary Questions is to ensure that persons who are temporarily away from their present normal residence for part

of the Enumeration Period, are enumerated in the locality in which they normally reside. This will be part of your job.

Persons who are absent from their Normal Residence during the whole Enumeration Period will be counted at the place where they have gone and you need not worry about them.

12. Temporary visitors who have not already been enumerated, should be enumerated where they are found no matter where they come from, unless they will be back at their normal place of residence in Pakistan at some later time during the Enumeration Period. If you enumerate them you must warn them not to allow themselves to be enumerated again. But if you do not enumerate them you should ask them to get themselves enumerated at their normal place of residence when they return there before 31st January, 1961.

Post Enumeration check:

13. In addition to normal Supervision and Checking during the Enumeration Period, a percentage of the Enumeration Schedules will be completely checked soon after the "BIG COUNT" in order to assess the accuracy of the Census. Every Census Officer should try to ensure that no defect is discovered in his work at that stage.
