REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE MANAGEMENT COMPANY

The Board of Directors of AKD Investment Management Ltd (AKDIML) is pleased to present the first annual report for AKD Income Fund (AKDIF), for the year ending 30th June 2007. The fund was launched in March '07 and this result covers approximately the first three months (100 days) of operation for the fund.

Investment Strategy

AKD Income Fund is a dedicated fund that focuses primarily on fixed income securities and instruments. The objective of AKDIF is to offer investors an ideal vehicle to invest in a diversified portfolio of fixed income securities/instruments that provide optimum returns with concern for preservation of capital.

Fund Performance

AKD Income Fund gave a return of 3.54% during the 100 days of operation. The Initial Public Offering of the fund was held from March 19th to March 22nd, 2007 at PkR50/unit. The fund closed the fiscal year at an NAV of PkR51.77076/unit on June 30th, '07. This translated to an annualized return of 12.92% (simple annualization). The gains were distributed to the unit holders in the form of a bonus of PkR 1.5937/unit (3.1761 bonus units for every 100 units held).

The fund booked a net income of PkR. 83.8mn, giving an EPS of PkR. 1.77 for the 100 days of operation.

At the close of the financial year 2007, 24.62% of the funds net assets were deployed in spread transactions, 66.22% were placed in term-deposits / cash and the remaining amount was invested in other debt instruments.

Market Performance

The yields of fixed income instruments declined during 4QFY07 as the State Bank of Pakistan avoided any significant rate hikes. Availability of ample liquidity in the system and the increasingly large sums available to fixed income funds ensured that the secondary market yields stayed fairly close to the risk-free rate.

Economy

The economy grew by a robust rate of 7% during FY07. SBP's tight monetary policy seems to have succeeded in controlling inflation with official CPI being 7.8% for FY07. SBP is not expected to raise interest rates significantly from current levels but will continue its hawkish stance in the medium-term until the inflation targets are achieved.

Units in issue

A total amount of PkR 1.2bn (23.7mn units @ PkR50/unit) was raised in the Pre-IPO, Seed Capital and IPO combined. At the close of the fiscal year 2007, there were 47.34mn units outstanding at PkR 51.7706/unit, translating to a total size of PkR2.45bn. This is a growth of 99.75% in terms of number of units in issue and 104% in terms of total assets under management of the fund for the 100 days of operation during FY07.

Payout to unitholders

The directors of AKDIML, in their meeting on July 11 '07, have approved a final bonus of PkR. 1.5937 per unit (3.1874% on the opening NAV for FY07). An investor holding 100 units as at June 30, 2007 was allocated 3.1761 units on the ex-bonus price of PkR 50.1770 per unit.

Compliance with the Code of Corporate Governance

The Board of Directors states that:

- a. The Financial Statements prepared by the Management Company of the Fund, present fairly its state of affairs, the result of its operations, cash flows and movement in equity & reserves.
- b. Proper books of account of the Fund have been maintained.
- Appropriate accounting policies have been applied in preparation of financial statements and accounting estimates are based on reasonable and prudent judgment.
- d. International Accounting Standards, as applicable in Pakistan, have been followed in preparation of financial statements and any departure there from has been adequately disclosed.
- e. The system of internal control is sound in design and has been effectively implemented and monitored.
- f. There is no doubt upon the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern.
- g. There has been no material departure from the best practices of corporate governance, as detailed in the listing regulations.

Asset Management Rating of the Management Company

In December 2006 JCR-VIS has upgraded the Management Quality rating of AKD Investment Management Ltd. (Management Company of AKD Income Fund) to 'AM3+' (AM-Three Plus).

While upgrading this rating JCR-VIS states "The upgrade takes into account the management's commitment to enhance fund management and administration capabilities and the measures taken in this regard over the last few months. We believe that the emphasis laid on in-house training of employees will go a long way towards development of a competent management team. Over the long run, growth in assets under management and diversity of investor base are expected to reflect management's efforts since the formation of the company."

Future Outlook

We do not expect any significant tightening of the monetary policy from current level. However, we do expect the SBP to continue with its current stance and maintain the interest rates at the current levels for the 1HFY08.

Bond and TFC markets are developing gradually in Pakistan, and these investment avenues will help the fixed income funds to provide higher yields than risk-free rates.

As a fund dedicated to the fixed income market, we keep on a look-out for quality high yielding fixed return instruments. The investors in the fund will benefit from the growth of debt market in Pakistan.

Appointment of Auditors

The Board of Directors of the Management Company have re-appointed Messrs A.F. Ferguson & Co. Chartered Accountants, as the Fund's auditors for the period 2007-08 as recommended by the Audit Committee.

The directors would like to take this opportunity to thank the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan and our trustee M/s Central Depository Company of Pakistan for their co-operation in establishing the fund. We would also like to thank the unit holders for their immense interest and cooperation in the launching of the fund. The board also appreciates the devoted work performed by the staff and officers of the company and the unitholders for their confidence in the Company, and their continued support and blessings.

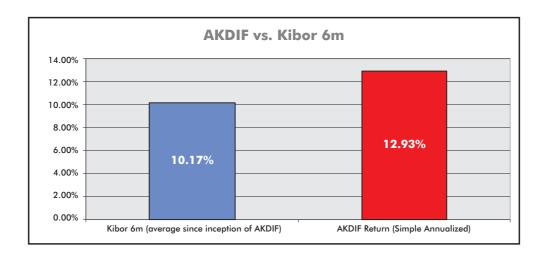
FUND MANAGER'S REPORT

The Management at AKD Investment Management Ltd (AKDIML) is pleased to present the first annual report for AKD Income Fund (AKDIF) for FY07. The fund was launched in March 2007 and the report covers approx 3 months (100 days) of operation for the fund.

Fund Performance

The fund's return for the 100 days of operation was 3.54% (Opening NAV: 50, Closing NAV: 51.77076). The bench-mark for the index is 6-month Kibor and average Kibor 6m for the period under consideration was 10.17%.

Following is a graphic presentation of the fund's annualized return versus the average Kibor 6m during the same period.



The fund earned a net income of PkR83.8mn during the period under consideration. Major contributors to this income are:

- Profit on bank deposits and certificates of musharika: PkR 35.5mn

Element of accrued income / (loss) and capital gain / (losses)
 included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed:

PkR 30.7mn

- Income from spread transactions: PkR 24.7mn

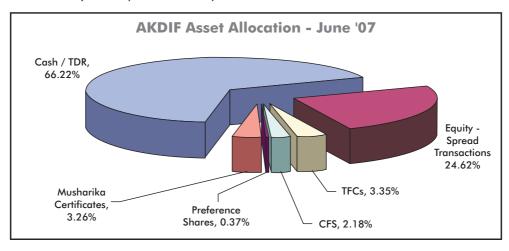
Investing Activities

The period under consideration was the first 100 operational days of the fund. Therefore, the fund managers are still in the process of building and optimizing the portfolio to maximize returns within the fixed income framework of the fund. The management team is primarily focused on enhancing the asset quality of the portfolio while improving the returns.

Majority of the fund's assets are currently concentrated in Equity Spread operations or are deployed in TDR / Cash. The fund managers will gradually shift capital from these avenues to TFCs or to Government and Corporate bonds offering yields over the reigning 6-month Kibor.

The current allocation (as of June 30th 07) of the net assets is as follows:

Future Strategy

The fund managers will continue allocating assets toward credit worthy TFCs and bonds offering Kibor-6m plus rates. The objective of the strategy is to build a balanced portfolio with 50% of the assets allocated within TFC and Bonds with a weighted average maturity period of 1 year. Floating rate instruments are preferred in the portfolio as our interest rate view is that of continuation of a tight monetary policy for the medium-term. We will shift our focus on fixed rate instruments on fist signs of a softening monetary policy.

Monetary policy at a glance

The tight monetary policy implemented by SBP has achieved its target by curtailing inflation. Recent rise in inflation numbers mainly fuelled by food-inflation is due to infra-structure bottle-necks. In its recent policy announced in July '07, SBP has reconfirmed its hawkish stance and raised the discount rates by 50bps, from 9.5% to 10%. This hike will result in rises in secondary interest rate chain. We see this measure as a fine tuning strategy to gradually suck out excess liquidity from the system. However, we do not expect SBP to significantly raise rates from the current levels for an extended time period as that will have serious negative impact on economic growth.

Future Outlook

As explained in our stance on the monetary policy, we do not expect interest rates to be significantly raised from the current level. Additionally, availability of liquidity will tend to keep secondary market yields under check as well. However, we foresee the overall debt market in Pakistan to grow and a thriving secondary market to develop. This will provide more investment avenues to fixed income funds and help improve the returns of these funds.

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE WITH THE BEST PRACTICES OF CODE OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

This statement is being presented by the Board of Directors of AKD Investment Management Limited (Company), the Management Company of the AKD Income Fund (Fund) to comply with the Code of Corporate Governance as contained in Regulation No.37 of the listing regulations of the Karachi Stock Exchange for the purpose of establishing a framework of good governance, whereby a listed company is managed in compliance with the best practices of corporate governance.

The company has applied the principles contained in the Code of Corporate Governance as follows:

- The Company encourages representation of independent non-executive directors. At present the Board has five independent non-executive directors.
- 2) The directors have confirmed that none of them is serving as a director in more than ten listed companies, including this company.
- 3) All the resident directors of the Company are registered as taxpayers and none of them has defaulted in payment of any loan to a banking company, a DFI or NBFI. or, being member of stock exchange, has been declared as a defaulter by such stock exchange.
- 4) During the year casual vacancies occurred in the Board due to resignation of Mr. Kashif Shamim and Mr. Mohammed Aliuddin Ansari which were filled by appointing Mr. Zahoor Motiwala and Mr. Ashraf Adamjee respectively by the Board.
- 5) The Company has prepared a 'Statement of Ethics and Business Practices', which has been signed by the Board of directors and employees of the company.
- 6) The Board has developed a vision and mission statement and significant policies of the Fund. A complete record of particulars of significant policies along with dates on which they were approved or amended has been maintained.
- 7) All the powers of the Board have been duly exercised and decisions on material transactions, including appointment and terms and conditions of employment of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) have been taken by the Board.
- 8) The Management Company has appointed Chief Financial Officer (CFO) / Company Secretary and internal auditor for the company under its management including their remuneration and terms & conditions of employment as determined by the CEO.
- 9) The roles and responsibilities of the Chairman and Chief Executive have been approved by the Board of Directors.
- 10) The meetings of the Board were presided over by the Chairman. Written notices of the Board Meetings along with agenda and working papers were circulated at least seven days before the meetings. The minutes of the meetings were appropriately recorded and circulated.

- 11) The Directors have been provided with the copies of the NBFC (Establishment and Regulation) Rule, 2003, Companies Ordinance 1984, Listing Regulation, Code of Corporate Governance, Prudential Regulations, Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association and all other relevant rules and regulations and hence are conversant with the relevant laws applicable to the company and the funds and are aware of their duties and responsibilities.
- 12) The Directors' Report for the period ended June 30, 2007 has been prepared in compliance with the requirements of the Code of Corporate Governance and fully describes the salient matters required to be disclosed.
- 13) The financial statements of the Company were duly signed by the CEO and CFO before approval of the Board.
- 14) The Directors, CEO and executives do not hold any interest in the units of the Fund other than that disclosed in the pattern of unit holding.
- 15) The Company has complied with all significant corporate and financial reporting framework requirements of the Code.
- 16) The Board has formed an audit committee. It comprises of three members, majority of whom are non-executive directors including the Chairman of the committee.
- 17) The terms of reference of the committee have been formed and advised to the committee for compliance.
- 18) The Board has outsourced the internal audit function to Ford Rhodes Sidat Hyder & Co. who are considered suitably qualified and experienced for the purpose and are conversant with the policies and procedures of the Fund and their representatives are involved in the internal audit function on full time basis.
- 19) The statutory auditors of the Fund have confirmed that they have been given a satisfactory rating under the quality control review program of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan, that they or any of the partners of the firm, their spouses and minor children do not hold units of the Fund and that the firm and all its partners are in compliance with International Federation of Accountants (IFAC) guidelines on code of ethics as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan.
- 20) The statutory auditors or the persons associated with them have not been appointed to provide other services except in accordance with the listing regulations and the auditors have confirmed that they have observed IFAC guidelines in this regard.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE PERIOD FROM OCTOBER 02, 2006 TO JUNE 30, 2007

1. LEGAL STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

AKD Income Fund (the Fund) was established under a Trust Deed executed between AKD Investment Management Limited (AKDIML) as the Management Company and Central Depository Company of Pakistan Limited (CDC) as the Trustee. The Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) authorised constitution of the Trust Deed on September 11, 2006 and it was executed on October 2, 2006 in accordance with the Non-Banking Finance Companies (Establishment and Regulation) Rules, 2003 (NBFC Rules). The Initial Public Offering (IPO) of the Fund was made during the period from March 19, 2007 to March 22, 2007 and the Fund commenced operations from March 23, 2007.

The Fund is an open ended mutual fund and is listed on the Karachi Stock Exchange (Guarantee) Limited. Units are offered for public subscription on a continuous basis. The units are transferable and can also be redeemed by surrendering to the Fund.

The principal activity of the Fund is to make investments in fixed income securities. Other avenues of investments include spread transactions in listed securities and transactions under Continuous Funding System.

2. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan and the requirements of the Trust Deed, the NBFC Rules, 2003 and the directives issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP). Approved accounting standards comprise of such International Accounting Standards as notified under the provisions of the Companies Ordinance, 1984. Wherever the requirements of the Trust Deed, the NBFC Rules, 2003 or directives issued by the SECP differ with the requirements of these standards, the requirements of the Trust Deed, the NBFC Rules, 2003 and the said directives take precedence.

2.1 Standards, interpretations and amendments to published approved accounting standards that are not yet effective.

The following standards, amendments and interpretations of approved accounting standards, effective for accounting periods beginning on or after November 1, 2006 are either not relevant to the Fund's operations or are not expected to have significant impact on the Fund's financial statements other than increased disclosures in certain cases:

- IFRS 2 Share based payment
- IFRS 3 Business combinations
- IFRS 5 Non-current assets held for sale and discontinued operations

- IFRIC 12 Services concession arrangements

- effective from accounting period beginning on or after January 1, 2007
- effective from accounting period beginning on or after January 1, 2007
- effective from accounting period beginning on or after January 1, 2007
- effective from accounting period beginning on or after January 1, 2007
- effective from accounting period beginning on or after January 1, 2007
- effective for accounting period beginning on or after November 1, 2006
- effective for accounting period beginning on or after March 1, 2007
- effective for accounting period beginning on or after January 1, 2008

3. BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

3.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except that certain financial assets have been included at fair value.

3.2 Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires the management to exercise its judgment in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The areas where various assumptions and estimates are significant to the Fund's financial statements or where judgment was exercised in application of accounting policies are as follows:

- i) Classification and valuation of investments (note 6)
- ii) Amortisation of preliminary expenses and floatation costs (note 9)

4. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

4.1 Investments

The Management Company determines the appropriate classification of the Fund's investments in accordance with the requirements of International Accounting Standard (IAS) 39; 'Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement', at the time of purchase and re-evaluates this classification on a regular basis. Investments of the Fund are categorised as follows:

4.1.1 Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Investments that are acquired principally for the purpose of generating a profit from short-term fluctuations in prices are classified as 'held for trading' in the 'Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' category. These investments are initially recognised at fair value and the transaction costs associated with the investments are taken directly to the income statement. Subsequent to initial recognition, these investments are marked to market using the closing market rates and are carried on the statement of assets and liabilities at fair value. The fair value of financial instrument traded in active market is based on quoted market prices. Net gains and losses arising on changes in fair value of these investments are taken to the income statement in the period in which they arise.

4.1.2 The Fund enters into transactions involving purchase of an equity security in the ready market and simultaneous sale of the same security in the futures market. The security purchased in ready market is classified as "Investment at fair value through profit or loss" and carried on the statement of assets and liabilities at fair value till their eventual disposal, with the resulting gain / loss taken to the income statement. The forward sale of the security in the futures market is treated as a separate derivative transaction and is carried at fair value with the resulting gain / loss taken to the income statement.

4.1.3 Loans and receivables

These are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

4.1.4 Available for sale

Investments intended to be held for an indefinite period of time, which may be sold in response to the needs for liquidity on changes in equity prices, are classified as 'available for sale'. Subsequent to initial measurement, 'available for sale' investments traded in an active market are re-measured to fair value using the closing market rates. Net gains and losses arising on changes in fair values of these investments are taken to equity as part of Unit Holders' Funds. When these securities are disposed off, the related fair value adjustments previously taken to equity are transferred to the income statement.

Investments in un-listed securities that do not have a quoted market price in an active market are valued at lower of cost and break-up value. Subsequent increases or decreases in carrying value are credited / charged to income statement. Break-up value of equity securities is calculated with reference to the net assets of the investee company as per the latest available audited financial statements.

4.1.5 All purchases and sales of securities that require delivery within the time frame established by regulation or market convention are recognised at the trade date. Trade date is the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset.

4.2 Securities under resale agreements - Continuous Funding System

Securities purchased under an agreement to resell (reverse repo) are included as receivable against Continuous Funding System (CFS) transactions at the fair value of the consideration given. All CFS transactions are accounted for on the settlement date. The difference between the purchase and sale price is treated as income from CFS transactions in the Income Statement and is recognised over the term of the transactions. Transaction costs are included in the initial measurement of all CFS transactions except for costs that may be incurred on disposal.

4.3 Issue and redemption of units

Units issued are recorded at the offer price, determined by the Management Company for the applications received by the distributors during business hours on that date. The offer price represents the net asset value per unit as of the close of the business day plus the allowable sales load, provision for transaction costs and provision for duties and charges, if applicable. The sales load is payable to the Management Company, investment facilitators or distributors.

Units redeemed are recorded at the redemption price, applicable to units for which the distributors receive redemption requests during business hours of that day. The redemption price represents the net asset value per unit as of the close of the business day less any back-end load, duties, taxes, charges on redemption and any provision for transaction costs, if applicable.

4.4 Element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed

An equalisation account called the 'element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) included in prices of units issued less those in units redeemed' is created in order to prevent the dilution of income per unit and distribution of income already paid out on redemption.

The Fund records the net element of accrued income / (loss) and realised capital gains / (losses) relating to units issued and repurchased during an accounting period in the income statement while the portion of the element of income / (loss) and capital gains / (losses) that relates to gains / (losses) that form part of the Fund's equity is recorded in a separate reserve account and any amount remaining in this reserve account at the end of an accounting period (whether gain or loss) is included in the amount available for distribution to the unit holders.

4.5 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Fund has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the amount of obligation can be made. Provisions are regularly reviewed and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

4.6 Net asset value per unit

The net asset value (NAV) per unit disclosed in the statement of assets and liabilities is calculated by dividing the net assets of the Fund by the number of units in circulation at the period end.

4.7 Taxation

The income of the Fund is exempt from income tax under clause 99 of Part I of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 subject to the condition that not less than ninety percent of its accounting income for the period, as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealised, is distributed amongst the unit holders.

The Fund is also exempt from provisions of section 113 (minimum tax) under clause II of part IV of the Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001.

The Fund provides for deferred taxation using the balance sheet liability method on all major temporary differences between the amounts used for financial reporting purposes and amounts used for taxation purposes. In addition, the Fund also records deferred tax asset on unutilised tax losses to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised. However, the Fund has not recognised any amount in respect of deferred tax in these financial statements as the Fund intends to continue availing the tax exemption in future years by distributing at least ninety percent of its accounting income for the year as reduced by capital gains, whether realised or unrealised, to its unit holders every year.

4.8 Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the statement of assets and liabilities when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

4.9 Financial assets and financial liabilities

Financial assets carried on the statement of assets and liabilities include bank balances, receivable against sale of investments, receivable against CFS, investments, dividend and other receivables and security deposits.

Financial liabilities carried on the statement of assets and liabilities include payable to Management Company, payable to Trustee, payable against purchase of investments, payable on redemption of units, accrued expenses and other liabilities.

At the time of initial recognition, all financial assets and financial liabilities are measured at cost, which is the fair value of the consideration given or received for it. Transaction costs are included in the initial measurement of all financial assets and liabilities except for transaction costs incurred for the acquisition of investments classified as 'financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' and transaction costs that may be incurred on disposal which are charged as expense when incurred. The particular recognition method adopted for measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities subsequent to the initial recognition is disclosed in policy statements associated with each item.

4.10 Impairment

The carrying value of the Fund's assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of such asset is estimated. An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

4.11 Revenue recognition

- Profit on bank deposits, certificates of musharika and term finance certificates is recognised on accrual basis.
- Realised capital gains / (losses) arising on sale of investments, in the nature of spread transactions, are included in the income statement in the period in which they arise.
- Income on reverse repurchase transactions and CFS transactions is recognised on an accrual basis.
- Unrealised capital gains / (losses) arising on marking to market of investments classified as 'financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' are included in the income statement in the period in which they arise.

4.12 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise of balances with banks in current accounts, saving accounts and other deposits with banks having original maturities of three months or loss

19. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Fund is primarily a money market fund, which invests in debt securities. Studies show that diversification of the investment into a number of securities and industrial sectors with a reasonably longer-term investment horizon reduces the risk associated with determination in returns of debt securities. The risk emanates from various factors that include, but are not limited to:

19.1 Market risk

Market risk is the risk of rise or fall in interest rates resulting from their dependence on market sentiments, speculative activities, supply and demand for finance and liquidity in the market. The value of investments may fluctuate due to change in business cycles affecting the business of the company in which the investment is made, change in business circumstances of the company, its business sector, industry and / or the economy in general.

The Management Company manages market risk by monitoring exposure on marketable securities by following the internal risk management policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee of the Management Company and regulations laid down by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan.

19.2 Credit risk

19.2.1 Credit risk management

Credit risk arises from the inability of the relevant brokerage house or the counter party to fulfill their obligations. There is a possibility of default by participants or failure of the financial markets / stock exchanges, the depositories, the settlements or the clearing system etc.

The Fund's policy is to enter into financial contracts in accordance with the internal risk management policies and investment guidelines approved by the Investment Committee. In addition, the risk is managed through assignment of credit limits and by following strict credit evaluation criteria laid down by the Management Company. The Fund does not expect to incur material credit losses on its financial assets.

19.2.2 Concentration of credit risk

Concentration of credit risk exists when changes in economic or industry factors similarly affect groups of counterparties whose aggregate credit exposure is significant in relation to the Fund's total credit exposure. Financial assets subject to credit risk amount to Rs 2,492.414 million. The Fund's portfolio of financial instruments is broadly diversified and transactions are entered into with diverse credit-worthy counterparties thereby mitigating any significant concentration of credit risk.

19.3 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund may encounter difficulty in raising funds to meet its obligations and commitments. The Management Company manages the liquidity risk by maintaining maturities of financial assets and financial liabilities and investing a major portion of the Fund's assets in highly liquid financial assets.

19.4 Market rate of return (MROR) risk

MROR risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in the market interest rates. The Fund manages its investments portfolio in order to reduce the risk of loss in market value of investments.

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19.5 Fair value of financial instruments

Investments on the Statement of Assets and Liabilities are carried at fair value. The Management Company is of the view that the fair market value of the remaining financial assets and liabilities are not significantly different from their carrying values since assets and liabilities are essentially short -term in nature.
